Mr. Bryan Says the Republican Party Is Enacting It.

OUR FALL TO COME LIKE BABYLON

Prophet of Woe Sounds Another Danger Call—National Policies Should Be Changed.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 22.—"Like Babylon of old, the United States is destined to have its fall, with the republican party in the role of Belshazzar, the responsible factor in its undoing."
This is the prediction of W. J. Bryan, who warns the government leaders that there will be a dismal awakening if national policies are not changed. In his Commoner Bryan says: "God bless the optimist!" shouts the republican sibilant. Well, optimism is good when it rests upon a sound foundation. It is bad when it blinds one to approaching doings. It is one thing to have faith in the ultimate triumph of a cause and quite another thing to ignore reasonable warning and the lessons of experience. We don't say, "God bless the man who stumbles into a hole without seeing it," or "God bless the man who sleeps while his house is burning."
There is a golden (and silver) mean between the doubt that retards healthy progress and the over-confidence that invites catastrophe.

trophy. Just now the republicans are very optimistic. They want to "let well enough alone." They resent any suggestion of reverse and shout at the possibility of calamity. They are rushing headlong into new conditions and are leading the country into untold paths. They are sure that we can maintain a republic here and at the same time administer a colony in the orient, unmindful of the fact that consistency will ultimately compel us to adopt at home the principles which we defend abroad.
They are sure they can safely encourage the growth of private monopolies, notwithstanding the inevitable tendency of man to use the power for his own selfish purposes. They think they can permit watered stock and fictitious capitalization, seemingly indifferent to the interests of those who must suffer from unjust rates in order that dividends may be paid on stock that reports no actual investment. They are giving free rein to the financiers, indifferent to the fact that in all history they have never been known to consider or conserve the interest of the producing masses.
They are allowing United States judges to abuse the writ of injunction when asked against laboring men, while those who violate the anti-trust laws go free, blind to the fact that such discrimination makes more anarchists than all the speeches ever delivered by Herr Most. Belshazzar was optimistic up to the night of Babylon's fall and the republicans of to-day are imitating him as closely as possible. There is the fatal optimism that refuse to recognize the logic of events and to apply reason to the affairs of government.

BARTHOLIN INQUEST

The Coroner's Jury Calls for the Arrest of the Son.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—The coroner's jury at the inquest over the body of Mrs. Anna Bartholin late yesterday brought in a verdict recommending that William Bartholin, her son, be arrested and held as principal for her murder, and that Oscar Thompson, alias Asburg, and Edward Counselman, be held to the grand jury as accessories to the crime.
The jury found that the woman came to her death on or about July 7, death being due to strangulation. The jury also recommended that every effort be put forth to capture William Bartholin.
Words of suspicion, fear and condemnation, coming from the grave, as it were, told the opinion Mrs. Bartholin entertained concerning her son William when Mrs. May Brown gave her testimony before the coroner's jury.
