HE WAS A "WORKER"

A Clerical Looking Party Who Has His Paper Barred From the Mails.

The New White House Which Has Been Practically Rebuilt This Summer.

From The Journal Bureau, Room 46, Post Office Building, Washington, Aug. 29.—Here is an incident which actually happened the other day in one of the offices of the third assistant postmaster general, a clerical-looking gentleman with tears in his eyes addressed one of General Madden's able assistants. Said he in earnest tones: "Are you a Christian worker?" "Not very," replied the assistant, "but you are, and for that reason your old paper has been barred from the mails."

Such, in fact, was the case. This was the president of a "climatic" concern which has been publishing an alleged religious weekly. The publishers claimed to have a circulation of 60,000; as a matter of fact, the claim was discovered by the department. Not long ago the concern sent out 60,000 letters to country people in almost every state in the union. They were presented with a sample copy of the paper, a monthly subscription and a request to buy a Bible. In most cases no attention was paid to the communication. But in the course of a month or six weeks all these people began to get letters demanding to know why they had not come up with the price of their subscription. If they paid no attention to this, they began to get letters of threat that the debt had been put in the hands of an attorney for collection; other letters said the publishers had written to the sheriff of that county; and at all other times they were asked to pay the money and save trouble. They were also reminded that they could secure a beautiful Bible for 90 cents, which transaction would be accepted by the company as a payment in full. Some submitted to this petty blackmail; but others wrote the postal authorities praying to be delivered from these "Christians." The Reverend Wolf in sheep's clothing came to Washington to see what was doing, and arrived just in time to discover that his paper would have to suspend operations.

Uncle Sam Fat and Lean. The American Protective Tariff league is out with a poster four feet square, on yellow paper, and containing pictures of Uncle Sam fat and lean together with long columns of figures calculated to show the wealth and prosperity of the country, and comparing conditions under republican and democratic administrations. Among other things it is alleged that the wealth per capita in 1900 was \$1,235. In 1860 it was \$514. The wages paid since 1879 are reported to have amounted to \$2,330,575,010.

Gold and Mosquitoes. The geological survey has reports of considerable hardships suffered by a party of explorers and topographers now in the mountains of the Rocky mountains. Brooks says that while cutting their way through three miles of almost impenetrable swamp their horses, though blanketed day and night, were so severely bitten by mosquitoes that some of them had to be shot. The country is reported to have all the indications of a gold bearing region, and gravel is found 2,000 feet above the level of the sea.

Does Water Purify Itself? "M. O. Leighton," of the geological survey has been authorized to begin a study of the running streams of the midwest, with a view to determining such questions as whether polluted water will purify itself in traversing a given distance. An account of the Chicago drainage canal is also being brought to the attention of the citizens of Illinois and Missouri. The department intends to make tests of numerous waters, especially those used for drinking purposes, and will keep on record the results of its work. In various parts of the country similar experiments have been conducted by the marine hospital service and by the chemical and bacteriological bureau of the department of agriculture.

Senator Frye's Marriage. Senator William Pierce Frye of Maine, who is soon to be married again, does not look the 71 years of his age. He is a healthy man, and his hair is of the blonde type, and though his face is deeply seamed and furrowed, he has a keen gray eye and a ruddy color that answers for youth. Senator Frye was evidently very fond of his first wife and when she died about a year ago he was nearly prostrated. For years they have lived together in the suite of rooms at the Hamilton Hotel overlooking Franklin Square. They were fond of riding on electric cars and this furnished their chief diversion. The senator's second marriage is doubtless the result of loneliness.

Manufacture of Women's Clothes. An industry which has sprung up within comparatively recent years is the manufacture of women's clothes. Up to the early part of the century it was confined to the making of cloaks, which, being heavy and difficult for home manufacture, and also susceptible of loose, easy fit which would include a number of operations of the same general dimensions, began to be made in small factories by piece work. It was not until the 30's that the industry of "clothes" was added. And it has been during the past few years that the most important and extensive branch of the industry has developed, namely, the making of all those garments included under the general term "clothes." The shirt waist is also a recent addition. At first only the cheapest grades were turned out ready-to-wear; but now the most expensive and elaborate can be had at a moment's notice.

A Saving of \$25,000. During the past year the government has been saved \$25,000 by the substitution of a small iron clip in place of rubber bands in the handling of registered mail in the general postal system. Superintendent Lewis of the supply division made up his mind a year ago that it was extravagant to issue rubber bands for this purpose, and told the postmasters he would give them the clips. There was a kick, but Lewis was obdurate. They did not get the bands, and the books at the end of the fiscal year showed the above sum "to the good."

The White House. When congressmen and others return to Washington this fall they will not recognize the old White House. Already the appearance has been radically altered. The grounds have been cut away on the side next the treasury department for a wide semi-circular driveway which will come into a new entrance on that side. It will be on a lower grade than the front entrance. There are to be two new wings made of pillars on the same side; and opposite, where the conservatory formerly was, will be a large addition. Next to this will be the new two-story brick structure for the executive offices. The interior is being more altered than the outside. In fact, it is being entirely rebuilt. There is

THEY MUST BE GOOD

General Injunction Forbidding Interference With Business of Elgin Creamery Company.

Under the Receivership Farmers Do Not Get Their Money and Have Made Trouble.

Special to The Journal. Madison, Wis., Aug. 29.—A new move in the Elgin creamery war last night promises to bring peace, as an injunction was issued forbidding any interference with the receiver. This is intended to block the taking of possession of the creamery to establish independent works. William H. Seaman of Milwaukee, judge of the United States supreme court for the eastern district of Wisconsin, sitting for Judge Romano Bunn for the western district court, issued the following orders: A general injunction against all persons interfering with the business or property of the company, as conducted by the receiver, the American Trust and Savings bank of Chicago. An order was made referring the matter to Henry M. Lewis, referee in bankruptcy of the western district court, with power to issue injunctions, and an order to show cause why he should not be committed for contempt of the federal court at Chicago, was issued against Thomas Johnson of Boaz, Richland county, for throwing the company's machinery out of the creamery building at Yuba, under lease to the company. Judge Seaman said that the farmers of Wisconsin and other persons in interest must understand that the business and property of the United States court, and any interference would be construed as contempt and would be punished severely. Disputes came from J. M. Garrison, superintendent of the Wisconsin branches, that two creameries had been seized in Monroe county, near Sparta. Other messages tell of threatened "taking of forcible possession" in other places. A United States marshal will leave for the scene of the trouble, armed with the injunction order.

The injunction is general in its terms and operates against all persons interfering with the property of the company or the continuance of the business. The farmers of Wisconsin, in the district in which the Elgin company operates are dependent upon the branches of the company for a market for their milk, the competitive creameries having all been absorbed by the company. They are opposed to taking their product to the plants in the possession of the receiver, as they have not been paid for a month. Having no other available market, they are trying to evade the receivership by throwing out the machinery and establishing independent plants in the buildings.

SLAIN AND ROBBED Experience of a Foolhardy American in Paris. Paris, Aug. 29.—"The Francat" contains the following story: "Victor Evandale, an American about 40 years of age, declared at a cafe table that he had lived for ten years in the wildest regions of western United States and had never carried a weapon and was never afraid. Several Frenchmen who were present told him that Paris was more dangerous. "They asserted that he could not go from Grenelle to Montrouge, for example, after 10 o'clock at night without being killed unless he wore laborers' clothes. "Evandale left the cafe after a time without reverting to the conversation about dangerous localities. "Next morning his companions of the night before were horrified to read of the discovery of Evandale's body in the glacial of the fortifications near the Maison Blanche. It is supposed he must have actually attempted to walk from Grenelle to Montrouge immediately after leaving his friends. "Evidently he was attacked from behind.
