### Normannaheimen STORY OF THE KISS

Dr. Nyrop of Copenhagen University  
Gains Vogue in Literary Circles by His Book.

Byron the Only English Authority  
on the Subject From Whom  
the Author Quotes.

Dr. Christopher Nyrop of the chair of romance philology in the University of Copenhagen, has become a sort of a vogue in literary circles by the publication of a distinctly unique work on "The Kiss and Its History."

It has been translated from the Danish by William Frederick Harvey, A. M., an English barrister who was formerly professor of English literature at the University of Malta. It comes fully accented, therefore, and its perusal is certain to bring considerable enlightenment and more than one smile. Nothing of quite this kind has place in English literature.

The work is divided into eight chapters, and the titles of these are worth setting down, in order to show the scope and universality of treatment. They run as follows: "What is a Kiss?" "Love Kisses," "Affectionate Kisses," "The Kiss of Peace," "The Kiss of Respect," "The Kiss of Friendship," "Various Kinds of Kisses" and "The Origin of Kissing." Professor Nyrop quotes voluminously from diverse authors on the continent of Europe, but Byron is the only Englishman—and, of course, an admitted authority—whose verses are cited, though one Scotch ballad finds place. Had the Danish author known Ben Jonson's "To Celia" and Swinburne's "Unkissed Kisses," says a critic, he would have had another chapter on "The Kiss of Metaphor" for a certainty. And the modern minor poets would have made his pages, had he availed himself of them sufficiently, too warm for summer reading.

#### BALDWIN'S STATEMENT.

Explorer's Version of His Quarrel with Captain Johanson.

Although the affidavits of Evelyn Baldwin, the American explorer, with reference to Captain Johanson, were not received by the Norwegian authorities as they had no jurisdiction over the quarrel between himself and Johanson, the contents are gradually coming out. It appears that Johanson resented the attempt of Mr. Baldwin to reduce him from the position of commander of the vessel to sailing master. The two have not spoken to each other since Christmas, 1901. Mr. Baldwin has several complaints to make, the chief one being that Captain Johanson refused to obey the orders of the ice pilot.

#### PEASANT'S BLESSING

King Oscar Touched by Aged Woman's Evidence of Loyalty.

A touching and pretty little incident is related in connection with King Oscar's recent visit to Throndhjem. A great crowd had assembled before the new Masonic Temple to see the king, who was to participate in the dedicatory exercises. In the throng was a little old woman, who on account of her age was given a favored place by a police officer. As the king passed by she stepped forward and fell on her knee before him, raising a pretty floral design fashioned in the form of a crown.

As she handed him the offering she said in her broad peasant dialect: "God bless the king and his queen and his whole house." The woman's humble loyalty and her kind sentiment quite overcame the monarch for a moment and tears stood in his eyes as he warmly thanked her.

#### REAL SEA SERPENT

Genuine Article Seen Recently Near Christiania.

A real sea serpent was seen near Christiania, Norway, on Aug. 11 by a party of eleven persons, among whom were two clergymen and an engineer. The serpent was plainly seen for about three minutes by all and for over ten minutes by two of the party, who had good marine glasses. It is described as having a flat, oblong head about two feet in length. Its movements were those of a serpent, the body waving up and down. At least 20 feet of the length were plainly visible and the monster is estimated to have been 50 feet long. None of the party were frightened, as the monster's course was away from the vessel, and they surveyed it in the calmest fashion. So say all of them.

#### MME. ANDREE CONFESSES

Admits That She Set Fire to the Andree Villa.

Mme. Andree, who was placed under arrest in Gothenburg, Sweden, charged with setting fire to the Andree villa, has confessed to the crime. When the matter came up for hearing the first time she was so ill that the case was continued. At the second hearing a written confession of guilt was presented to the court. She confessed that the jewelry which she said had been stolen had been concealed by her in a traveling bag and taken to Marstrand, and on her journey to Gothenburg the bag had been thrown into the sea.

No motive for her strange conduct has been suggested. The court ordered an examination into her mental condition. Mme. Andree is a sister-in-law of the famous explorer, Dr. Andree.

Member of Storching Killed. Ole Glimbecken Fuglestad, a member of the Norwegian storching for Lister and

Mandal, was gored and trampled by a 4-year-old bull. On the evening of Aug. 9 he went to the pasture to get the cattle and was set upon by the vicious animal. His body was found the next morning, very badly mangled about the head and breast.

Fuglestad was born in 1843 and was educated as a teacher. In the storching he was a leading figure, frequently taking part in debates. His geniality and integrity won him many friends. Alternate Th. N. Stoussland will take the vacant seat.

#### Church to Be Reopened.

The Augustana Swedish Lutheran church has been closed during the summer in order to permit extensive repairs and decoration, will be reopened next Sunday. Service will be held at the usual hour in the morning. In the evening special services will be held with the assistance of the Orpheus Singing Society and the choir. Dr. C. J. Petri, pastor of the church, will speak in English and Professor J. S. Carlson of the state university in Swedish.

#### Will Consider It.

President Deuntzer of the Danish ministry has acknowledged the receipt of the petition from the Danish Peace society asking the government to join with Sweden and Norway in a declaration for complete neutrality in all international matters. President Deuntzer replies that the ministry will consider the matter at the first opportunity.

#### End of a Courageous Life.

A peculiarly and death was that of Dr. Axel Brustad who died recently at Lake Park, Minn. He was a baker from Norway and came to St. Paul nine years ago. After five years of hard work at his trade he had saved up enough money to carry him through the medical department of the University of Minnesota. He had barely become located when a fatal illness overtook him just as his life's ambition was about to be realized. Dr. Brustad was 34 years old at the time of his death.

#### Rich Iron Deposits Found.

Rich iron deposits have been discovered near Vadsoe, Norway. Analyses of the ore shows that it contains 50 per cent of the best quality of iron. It is taken for granted that mining operations will be started at once.

#### "Swedish Teater."

The Swedish Dramatic society will open its season with a performance at Dania hall next Sunday. This early date is selected on account of the state fair, which will attract many visitors who desire to see a Swedish dramatic show. A triple bill will be presented, "His Sunday-go-to-Meeting Coat," "At the Janitor's" and "A Clear" with Miss Emma Nilsson and Richard Rosengren in the leading roles.

#### Cooked Meat for Soldiers.

Norway's army commissariat department is about to revive the old Scandinavian art of cooking meat for the benefit of troops on the march. After the meat has been heated to the boiling point the cooking process is completed by imbedding the portion in hay. Beef, mutton or other flesh treated in this manner can be preserved hot for an indefinite period even in the coldest weather.

#### Curb the Corporations.

As a remedy for the conditions produced by the spread of the timber industry in northern Sweden, a royal commission has formulated drastic measures against corporations engaged in exploiting the forest lands regardless of the ruin caused to agriculture by denuding the land of its trees.

#### World's Y. M. C. A. Congress.

The world's Y. M. C. A. congress opened in Christiania, Norway, Aug. 19, with over 1,000 delegates, representing thirty-one countries. In attendance, The United States were represented by thirty-eight official delegates. The congress closed last Sunday.

#### Attack Political Apathy.

Norwegian home rulers are making the pending elections in Sweden an occasion for attacking the political apathy of the neighboring state. 
