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SIoux FALLS, S. D.—In view of the destruction by fire of the Great Northern building here, the company has decided to erect a modern brick passenger and freight building near the heart of the business district. Pending its completion, the company is operating its train from the Omaha road. MURDER SUSPECTED

Dismembered Body of Anoka Boy Found by the Track.

ANOKA, MINN.—Ralph C. Watson, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Watson, met a horrible death yesterday. The body of Anoka and Coon Creek. He was ground to pieces under a Northern Pacific freight train. The body was found on the tracks. Both legs were cut off, one arm was almost severed near the shoulder and the skull was fractured. Beside the body, wide open and with the blade buried in the ground, was a pocketknife. Tracks on the ground showed that the body had been moved. His pockets were wrong side out and empty, except for his watch, which was safe in his trousers pockets, tied by a string. The body was removed to Anoka and an examination showed an extensive fracture of the skull. Authorities are looking up Watson's associates of the night before and will endeavor to find out how much money he spent in Anoka County. Attorney Pratt is inclined to believe the man was killed by a train and robbed afterwards.

FERGUS FALLS, MINN.—The will of the late Ole H. Isheng, which bequeathed \$2,000 to the widows and orphans of deceased fishermen, has been admitted to probate. The attorneys for the heirs alleged that the will did not meet the requirements of the instrument and was not properly witnessed and attested. Judge Frankberg finds that the latter content is correct, and accordingly sets the will aside. The sun club held the last shoot of the season Saturday. The medals were won by W. H. Dewey and W. WINNIPEG, MAN.—The building contractors in Winnipeg have their hands full. It is probable that before the season closes permits for buildings to the value of almost another million dollars will be issued.
