WILL BE THOROUGH AS OBJECT LESSON COURTS BUSY DAY GAIN OF MILLIONS

Minneapolis Wheat Receipts for the Crop Year Which Closed Sept. 1, Show Gain. They Were 2,419,440 Bushels in Excess of Those for Year Previous.

For the crop year ending Sept. 1, Minneapolis received 2,419,440 bushels of wheat. This is a gain of 2,419,440 bushels over the previous year, and had it not been for the exceptionally early weather that has prevailed for weeks and the extremely light movement of wheat to market in August, the gain would have been much greater.
