BASKETS OF GRASS

Basketry Students Hunt in the Swamps and Fields.

BEST VARIETY GROWS IN SAND

No Dyes Are Used, but Color Is Obtained From the Native Materials.

Miss Lina Eppendorff, teacher of basketry in Fruit Institute, Brooklyn, and her friend, Miss Sarah Francis, are the pioneers. It is said, in combining native products, natural colorings, clever weaves and forms in artistic basketry.

Their students, who will be found this summer exploring swamps, meadows and beaches, will tie their finds into small bunches and label them with data as to the time gathered and the soil and place from which they are taken.

leaf, are also employed when their colors and qualities are wanted. In the baskets, although there are found hues that glow and gleam in a wealth of variety and tone. To obtain these hues has required long study and experiment. This grass has a broad leaf, which is not yet. To get beautiful colors was simple enough, but to obtain permanency of hue was another problem, and since the work is yet in its early stages there is still much to learn.

Baskets, however, made four years ago, have lost nothing of their wonderful sunshine glow nor of their exquisite tones of pinks, red, purples, greens, yellows and ivory whites. Some of the baskets which have thus retained their charm have been scrubbed with soap and water from dust and soil.

Many of the best materials are found in sandy soil. Beach grass has a beautiful light green shade and lustrous quality which makes it extremely desirable and one of the choicest for color. This grass has a broad leaf, which, upon gathering, withers into a fine, strong wire, which can be adapted to any use. It is at its best in August and September.

gather in November, but grass of this sort at that standing from the previous year and cut in July contributes strong fiber and rich color. The grass that is familiar to every one because of its pink golden brown in the meadows through the winter is used for the inner coils, over which to place the outer covering of finer grass. This grass is to be had in great quantities, but if it is gathered too early it will be brittle. It is one of the choicest of the grasses, and has a great variety of tints.

Reds are found mostly in the fall. A prolific source is the base of the flag leaves in October. Both ivory white and pink are obtained from the reeds. Ivory white is found, too, in the colorless stalk of a grass that bears little brown rice-like seeds, like the wild rice of the west. It is ready for gathering in November. Corn husks provide a number of colors—dark red, brilliant pinks and purples, pale green and deep, dark yellows. A kind of dark red popcorn is a most useful source for some of the richest tones. The sweet flag (calamus) has a silvery white leaf with a beautiful brown lining. This produces alternating hues of the white and brown.

An advantage of grass basketry weaving over that of paper is that the grass seldom needs mending, while the paper must be used wet. The latter has given rise to the term "bathtub parties" to designate classes and gatherings where the bath tub, with its soaking rattan, is the center of attraction.

southern grasses in tropical countries there are many suggestions which may furnish far greater diversity than has been shown in the past. Grotesque or unique forms in the baskets have not been attempted, but all have been adapted to household use. Trays, bowls and simple vase forms are the usual kinds.

In design it has been the aim to let the material guide, and not force it into conventional patterns. This accounts for the streaks of sunshine, the gleaming, glowing spots of pinks and red and purple, and the charming blends of browns and ivory white and greens and yellows.
