

SUNK WITH ALL HANDS ON BOARD

Admiral Killick, Crew and Ship Sent to the Bottom by the Germans.

The Revolutionary Gunboat Crete-Pierrot Considered a Pirate.

The Haitian Government Tells Germany That It Approves of the Affair.

Berlin, Sept. 8.—The German foreign office... The Haitian provisional government has communicated to Germany that Haiti regarded the Crete-Pierrot as a pirate.

The Official Story. The marine ministry has given out the following official report of the sinking of the Crete-Pierrot.

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The Crete-Pierrot was a vessel of 650 tons displacement. She was armed with one 6.2-inch, one 4.7-inch, four 3.9-inch, two Maxim machine-guns and four Nordenfeldt machine-guns.

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Cause of the Trouble. The German steamer Markomanna, Captain Nansen, belonging to the Hamburg-American Packet company, having on board arms and ammunition sent by the Haitian government to Cape Haitien, was stopped Sept. 2 by the Crete-Pierrot.

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MAY COMPEL AMES TO RETURN

The Mayor Does Not Respond When His Cases Are Called in Court.

County Attorney Will Insist on His Return by First Day of September Term.

Dr. Ames Makes Application for License to Practice in Indiana—Its Granting Conditional.

Unless Mayor A. A. Ames appears in court within a very few days the governor will be forced to issue requisition papers for his compulsory return.

The several cases against him were called in Judge Brooks' courtroom this morning, but the mayor did not respond.

Neither was he represented by attorney A. B. Jackson, who had been in court, appeared and asked to have reinstated the bond that was declared forfeited by Judge McGee last week.

Judge Brooks, however, refused to reinstate the bond and remarked, rather tartly, that the mayor should be here to meet the charges pending against him.

ASKS FOR A LICENSE. Dr. Ames Seeks for Legal Standing as Physician in Indiana.

Dr. A. A. Ames, late mayor of Minneapolis, has filed application with the state medical board of Indiana for a temporary certificate to practice medicine in Indiana until the annual meeting of the board in January, 1903.

When Dr. Ames applied for a certificate he filed his license to practice in Minnesota, dated Dec. 21, 1883, his diploma from Rust Medical college, issued in 1882; his master-in and master-out papers as surgeon of the Seventh Minnesota, and his commission as surgeon-general on the staff of Governor Van Sant.

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
