DENVER GATE OPEN
Rock Island Given Better Chance to Meet Northern Competition.

In order to retain business that is being deflected more and more to the "merger lines," the Union Pacific has announced that it will accept from the Rock Island road at Denver traffic for North Pacific coast points that has heretofore been received at the Missouri river. The new arrangement will give the Rock Island road the "long haul" and will encourage it to compete with more vigor against its northern competitors. But the action of the Union Pacific has awakened some surprise in view of the fact that its "Denver gateway" has been closed since 1896.

GET THE BUSINESS
President Burt's Instructions to His Agents Despite Indictments.

If President Burt of the Ann Arbor road, recently indicted here by the federal grand jury for alleged rate cutting, is accurately reported, he has instructed his agents at Grand Rapids, Mich., that no such trifle as a federal law will interfere with his road's business. He explains that his line is a "weak line" and that it can't afford to comply with tariffs in opposition to "big roads" like the Pennsylvania and the Vanderbilt lines.

Want Larger Share.
The desire of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific roads to favor their merging associate, the Burlington, has aroused protests from the Minneapolis-Chicago lines not so happily situated.

G. N.'s August Earnings.
The gross earnings of the Great Northern for August were given out yesterday as \$3,678,275, an increase of \$566,977 over the corresponding month last year. The total increase for July and August has been \$1,341,364.

So Officials' Trip.
President Thomas Lowry and General Manager Pennington of the Soo line left last night for Sault Ste. Marie, where they will meet Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific. The party will then inspect the Soo system before the annual meeting of that company, which is to be held here next Tuesday.

Pennsylvania vs. Wabash.
The Pennsylvania road is believed to have secured control of the Pere Marquette line as an offset to the recent acquisition of the Ann Arbor line by the Wabash company. The Pere Marquette, with 1,900 miles of track and terminals at Toledo, Detroit, Port Hudson and Saginaw, gives the Pennsylvania the strategic advantage upon the Michigan peninsula.

Rate Clerks' Meeting.
Rate clerks of the railways centering at the twin cities and Duluth held a meeting yesterday at St. Paul. Some changes in rates were made as the result of the close of navigation on the lakes. Other changes were brought about by a new Michigan Central tariff and by the opening of the new Washington & Great Northern line, an extension that taps the Republic mining camp in Washington and the Colville Indian reservation.

Passenger Agents Leave To-Morrow.
The twin city traveling passenger agents, who are going to a convention of their fellows in Montreal, will leave to-morrow evening.

RESULT OF JUNKET BUMPER "KIB" CROP EXHIBIT IS POPULAR

Sentiment in Favor of Public Baths at Old City Hall Strengthened by St. Paul Trip.

Meeting of Council Committee To-morrow—Those Who Took Trip Yesterday.

As a result of the junket of Minneapolis aldermen to St. Paul yesterday, Alderman James Dwyer, chairman of the council committee on a municipal bathhouse, has decided to call a meeting of the committee to-morrow. Both Mr. Dwyer and Dr. P. H. Hall, health commissioner, who headed the party which visited St. Paul yesterday, are confident, after having given the Minneapolis aldermen a chance to see what St. Paul has done for the public in the way of free bathhouses, that the proposition to convert the old city hall into a municipal bathhouse, which will be open to the public both summer and winter, will be readily adopted.

The regular meeting of the council will be held Friday evening, and the sentiment at the city hall is that the offer made by the St. Paul philanthropist, whose name will probably be announced at that occasion, will be accepted. The gentleman is willing to give to the city the necessary amount of money to turn the old building into a municipal bathhouse. It is altogether likely that the council will devote it to that purpose.

FIRST GRADE CERTIFICATES.
A very gratifying increase in the number of first-grade teachers is noted by State Superintendent of Schools Oleson. He has issued 700 certificates of 300 over last year.
