HOW WALLACE VOTED
Certain men who are working in the interests of E. E. Smith, a candidate for senator in the forty-third district, are making certain false statements relative to Carl Wallace, the rival candidate, calculated to injure him. They are saying Mr. Wallace voted last winter to cut the personal property exemption down to \$25. The truth is, not one member of the legislature voted to do this.

It is true the bill reported by the tax commission provided for a \$25 exemption. It is also true that Governor Van Sant sent the legislature a message, suggesting that the exemption be placed back at \$100.

Acting on this suggestion, Mr. Roberts of Hennepin on Feb. 19 offered an amendment to the tax code, making the exemption \$100. Mr. Nyquist of Elys Earle then offered a substitute for Mr. Roberts' amendment, making the exemption \$200, the limit allowed by the constitution.

When the vote was taken on the substitute, it was carried by a vote of 70 for to 31 against. Mr. Wallace was one of those voting for the substitute of Mr. Nyquist, so that when the final vote was taken on the tax code, the amount of property exempt under it was \$200.

These facts are all to be found in the house journal of Feb. 19, hence the statements relative to Mr. Wallace are known to be false by whoever authorized or procured them to be made.







Carried the thirty-ninth district, which usually goes 500 republican, by vote of 2393 to 2217, as democratic-people's candidate for city controller in 1898.

Organized in 1896 the citizen-taxpayers' movement which secured from the state board of equalization a reduction of \$26,500,000 in the city's assessed valuation, followed by a reduction of \$394,000 in the city expenditures and taxes.

Chairman of the committee of three which secured from the legislature and from the people the constitutional amendment and statute providing for a home rule city charter.
