HOW MINNE GROWS

Wonderful Strides Made by the City Shown by Newcomers in Public Schools.

Children Enrolling Have Recently Come From Various States and From Europe.

Evidence of the increasing growth of Minneapolis is shown by the greatly increased number of new pupils in the public schools. Reports from principals show that there has been a genuine hejira to the four city; and that not only from neighboring states, but from across the Atlantic as well.

At the Douglas school alone, the newcomers represent recently arrived families from the states of Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Pennsylvania, New York, Washington, North Dakota, South Dakota and Vermont, and from the District of Columbia.
