VERY FEW TO SPARE

C. B. Buckman's Narrow Margin in the Sixth as Shown by Canvassing Board.

Foster Will Take Case Into Court—Dowling Will Not Contest—Volstead Vote.

The official count of the state canvassing board gives C. B. Buckman 47 majority in the sixth district, and A. J. Volstead 200 plurality in the seventh. The vote was counted and the board refused to accept any judicial powers. The protests of A. F. Foster and M. J. Dowling, the defeated candidates, were made a part of the records, but the board decided that contest proceedings would have to be brought in court. The candidates have until Saturday to institute such proceedings. Mr. Foster declared that he would begin contesting the vote attempt to have the Cass county vote thrown out entirely. He also objects to the reception of the Benton and Morrison county votes, because the counties only certified totals, and did not give the vote by precincts.

M. J. Dowling is not likely to go into the courts. He consulted several attorneys yesterday, and the consensus was that he had a case against the printers of the ballots in Grant and Yellow Medicine counties, but that the courts would not throw out the vote of either county on the showing made.

Seventh District Vote.

The seventh district vote was canvassed and showed Dowling 200 short of the Volstead vote. Swift county certified eleven votes for Andrew J. Dowling, which were claimed by both Dowling and Volstead. The vote cast as follows:

Without these, Edeco has 8,412 votes, Edson 5,504, and Jellison 1,244.

Stevens Lonely Sprint.

Congressman Stevens, who was unopposed in the fourth district, got 1,622 votes in Chicago county, 1,659 in Washington, and 8,166 in Ramsey, a total of 11,447.

F. M. Crosby received 6,355 votes for the republican nomination for judge of the district court in the first judicial district. His opponent, J. N. Seales, received 3,297 votes. There is no democratic nominee. W. B. Anderson, who had no opposition for the republican nomination for judge in the third district received 4,143 votes, and Arthur H. Snow, the democratic nominee, 2,408 votes.

W. A. Cant received 6,251 votes, and J. D. Ensign, 6,435 votes in the eleventh judicial district, where the judge is nominated by the voters. John B. Richards, the only democratic candidate, received 1,099 votes. Judge Gorham Powers of the Twelfth judicial district, has no opposition in either party, and received 8,168 votes.

OFF FOR THE PRESENT

The Packing House Combine Does Not Like the Signs in the Political Heavens.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—The combination of the great packing houses of the country which has been under consideration and in process of actual formation for the last six months, has been abandoned, at least for the present, says the Tribune. The decision not to complete the combination is due in a large degree to the attitude of the national administration toward trusts as outlined by President Roosevelt in his recent speeches, and to the possibility that in the event of a consolidation congress might remove the tariff on cattle.

It was learned last night that a final meeting of the heads of the firms known as the big four packing combine had been held, at which it was agreed to end all negotiations at once. This was followed by an order issued from the office of Swift & Co. that the firm's employees should immediately discontinue the inventory of property and stock which had been ordered and started for the purpose of tabulating a report of the financial condition of the company which was to have been used as a basis of the division of shares in the combine.

MONEY'S TIGHTENERS

Individuals and Firms Withdraw Bank Balances to Loans.

New York, Sept. 24.—The local financial situation excited considerable interest yesterday. Money on call fluctuated between 11 and 20 per cent before noon, opening at the first figure and advancing to 20 per cent by noon. By noon the rate had eased off to 12 per cent. An unusual and significant feature was the lending of money by individuals and firms who withdrew the greater part of their bank balances and made loans direct. Naturally this curtailed the supply of bank money and created some ill feeling between the banks and their clients. One prominent broker-house is reported to have taken \$1,000,000 cash out of two banks, lending the money at from 15 to 18 per cent. Two leading houses reported that withdrawals by their out-of-town correspondents, presumably in the west and southwest, had been unusually heavy. These drafts, it was added, were for crop purposes. Considerable money is reported to be going to Chicago, Cleveland and St. Louis. A number of out-of-town banks pursued their usual course on this occasion by withdrawing balances from the local banks and loaning them direct on the floor of the exchange. Local branches of the Canadian banks were heavy lenders at the higher rate.

In the last hour the rates for call loans were quoted at from 10 to 13 per cent.

THEY MAY GET TOGETHER

The Spanish War Veterans Favor Amalgamation With the Other Association.

Detroit, Sept. 24.—At the convention of the Spanish war veterans yesterday Captain Wilson I. Davenney of Chicago, a representative of the United Services Men of the Spanish War, being asked to speak referred hopefully to the possibility of amalgamating the different associations of Spanish war veterans. He said that President Roosevelt urged him yesterday to aid the movement, "and," said Captain Davenney, "if amalgamation can be arranged on a basis that will be just and equitable you will not find me in the way."

A resolution favoring amalgamation was introduced by Colonel Champe Andrews of New York and enthusiastically adopted. Not a dissenting voice was heard.

The resolution provides for the appointment of a committee of five to meet with a similar committee from the Spanish-American war veterans and discuss the details.
