FINE WORKS OF ART

The Third Annual Fine Arts Exhibition Now Open at the Public Library.

Figure and Genre Pictures Predominate Though the Collection Is Excellently Balanced.

The delayed opening of the third annual exhibition of paintings under the auspices of the Minneapolis Society of Fine Arts took place in the public library gallery last night, at the private view for members of the society and their friends. This morning the collection was opened to the public and will remain open until Oct. 12. The gallery will be open on weekdays until 10.

The number of pictures shown by the local artists is small, but the quality of the work compares very favorably with any in the collection. "Hennepin Avenue After a Spring Shower" is one of the most attractive pictures Mr. Koehler has painted for some time, and the portrait of a boy by John H. Rich is a strong and vigorous piece of work. Miss Wales, Miss Roberts and Mrs. E. A. Barnes are each represented by some excellent water color work.

William M. Chase: "Nursery Rhymes," a simple, strong study of a mother and child, by Frederick Freer; an admirable landscape, "Clearing Mists," by H. H. Gallison; two portraits in a light, joyous key, by Miss Harrison of Minneapolis; three exquisite snowscapes by Birge Harrison; a snowy street with dark buildings entitled "The Shoemaker's Shop," by Childe Hassam; "The Hour-Glass," by Miss Macomber; a marine by Frank K. M. Felm.

One of the noticeable things about the exhibition is the preponderance of figure and genre pictures. There is also a strong classic and decorative element represented by the canvases of Amanda B. Sewell, Robert V. Sewell, Will H. Low and E. H. Potthast.

Benson should be so well represented, for they are the leaders of a school of colorists high in popular favor and of splendid artistic attainments. Both are particularly happy in their treatment of women's portraits, and the examples in the present collection are of their best in this field. Their women are very modish and, if not always ideally beautiful, interesting and graceful.

Turner's "Mary," one of his typical devotional figures with its peculiarly fitting oriental touch; Daingerfield's "Holy Family"; a very effective and interesting group of mountain studies of the Jungfrau in its most varied aspects, by C. C. Curran; two beautiful and poetic landscapes by Charles H. Davis; a portrait of a little girl, by Lydia Emmet Field; Miss Ahrens' "Sewing," a portrait of an elderly woman; Max Bohm's portrait and his "Fisherfolk on the Beach," recently presented to the library gallery; "The Fairy Tale," by Sergeant Kendall; Edgar Cameron's "Dawn," a fine marine of strong, fresh coloring; a studio interior and a piece of still life by
