SAVED A NEAT SUM

The Efficient Work Done by S. L. Ingram in the T. M. Roberts Bankruptcy Case.

Over \$20,000 Has Been Saved to the Creditors—Slices From Big Claims for Fees.

Twenty thousand dollars is the neat sum saved to the creditors of T. M. Roberts by objections to a report by a representative of several creditors.

Last March S. L. Ingram, now manager of the T. M. Roberts Supply company, through an attorney, succeeded in having Referee Merriman reduce the different claims for fees to a total of \$12,300.

The final report of Trustee Frank W. Shaw was filed with Referee Merriman, Sept. 25. It contained three items which Mr. Ingram considered in need of pruning.

Two Dividends. The first dividend paid was \$31-3 per cent, the second will be 4.99 per cent. The secured claims against Mr. Roberts were \$293,855, the unsecured were \$479,810.17.

For eastern creditors Messrs. Ingram and Mann purchased the stock at 6 3/4 per cent of its appraised value which was as large a price as another individual bid for the whole stock.

The president of the new company is James A. Lansing, president of the Scranton, Pa. Works, and vice president, Thomas W. Ross, secretary and treasurer of the Ross & Sprague company of Cleveland.

YEAR'S WORK WAS HEAVY. A CALL FOR DELEGATES

Annual Meeting of the Associated Charities—Officers Re-elected—The Election of Directors.

The eighteenth annual meeting of the board of directors of the Associated Charities has just been held. The board elected the following persons as directors for the term expiring 1905: J. R. Kingman, W. F. Decker, F. E. Wells, Mrs. C. W. Keyes, Mrs. D. Edmund Smith, T. W. Stevenson and Professor Sven Oftedal.

In the year the organization has done a large amount of work. The statistical year ends June 1, and in the year ending June 1, 1902, 1,746 applications were made; 475 of these were from new families, 498 of them from old ones. There were 748 second calls. The number of persons in the home care was 2,600.

Up to Sept. 1 the visiting nurses had made 614 calls, and in that time had a remarkable record for the careful work that has been done in this department.

Co-operation with the association has greatly improved over the past years. 457 different individuals, churches, hospitals, societies, employers, business firms, physicians and public officers having assisted the association in the work it has done.

The expense of maintaining the association for the year has been \$4,880.69; the receipts have been \$5,322.43; leaving a balance on hand of \$441.74.
