

FOOTBALL TRY-OUT FOR TEAM

Ames Game Saturday Will Largely Determine Make-up of the Gopher Football Eleven.

Harris Is Again in the Game at Quarter—Strathern Is Tried at Guard.

Football practice on Northrop field yesterday evening was spirited. Harris was in the game at quarter after a week's absence on account of an injured thumb, and he ran the team with great speed, instilling considerable life into the other players.

The Ames game, moreover, will give the candidates for the various positions a real try-out. Ames is reported to have a fine practice team, and the Iowa are being coached this year by Ristine, a former Harvard back.
