Why Nicaragua and Costa Rica Are Butting Into the War on the Isthmus.

Colombia Likely to Fight Them—A Very Much Mixed Up Affair.

New York Sun Special Service. —Colombia, Oct. 2.—The threatened war between Colombia and Nicaragua. The relations between the two countries are so strained that an open declaration of hostilities is only a matter of time.

The Colombian officials declare that Nicaragua's real motive in aiding and abetting the revolution is to prolong the war on the isthmus and to be responsible for the United States to negotiate a treaty for the Panama canal.

Costa Rica also is believed to be secretly aiding the Colombian rebels because the construction of the Nicaragua canal; the Costa Rican government has entered an official denial of its responsibility for the filibustering expeditions which have left that country for Colombia.
