TEACHER KILLS FOUR

Awful Story of Blood From a Mennonite Settlement Across the Line in Manitoba.

Murderer Attempts Suicide After Mortally Wounding School Men and Two Children.

Grand Forks, N. D., Oct. 10.—H. I. Toews, a school teacher at Altoona, the first station on the Great Northern on the Manitoba side of the line yesterday afternoon fatally wounded two members of the school board and two of his pupils. The other member of the board and another pupil were wounded. After committing his grisly crime Toews attempted to escape. Hard pressed by a mad mob, he emptied his revolver into his head and fell mortally wounded.

Altoona is in the center of the Mennonite settlement, most of the members of

which are prosperous farmers. Toews was himself a Mennonite. For some time there has been friction between him and other members of the community, complaint having been made concerning the manner in which he had treated the three members of the board of trustees, John Hiebert, Abraham Remset and Peter Kehler, have expressed dissatisfaction with the work of the teacher, and there has been some hard feeling. The members of the board visited the school yesterday afternoon, according to a prearranged plan, to talk matters over with the teacher. School was still in session, and instead of inviting his visitors inside, Toews went out himself, leaving his pupils at work in the building.

Armed Himself in Advance.

The trustees referred to the complaints that had been made to them and the teacher tried to defend himself from the accusations. As the talk progressed, Toews became very angry, and there was loud talk and hard words. It is evident that Toews had gone to school expecting a conference, for he had armed himself with a seven-shooting revolver.

Suddenly he drew the weapon and fired at Remset. The bullet took effect in the trustee's side and he fell to the ground, fatally wounded. Hiebert was then shot in the side. He also was mortally wounded. The two shots were fired almost at one time, and none of the men had time to move.

Kehler, who had stood a little further off than the others, sprang forward when the shots were fired and attempted to wrest the weapon from the frenzied man. He was successful in disturbing the aim of the weapon, and as it was discharged he was shot in the hand, the bullet breaking his fingers and forcing him to release his hold on Toews. Toews then sprang into the schoolroom determined to complete his revenge.

Among the pupils were two daughters

of Kehler, aged respectively 8 and 10 years. These he shot through the body, and the 11-year-old daughter of Remset he shot in the arm. Her injuries will not be fatal. Toews then left the building, escaping Kehler, who was confused by the horror of the tragedy.

The teacher started to run toward the station, probably with the intention of taking a train out of the place. Some of the neighbors who had heard the shooting gave chase on horseback, and though the murderer had a good start, there was no opportunity for concealment, and when he saw that his pursuers were rapidly gaining upon him, he stopped and emptied the remaining chambers of his weapon into his own head.

The bullet was of small caliber, and though the wound is a serious one and the man will probably die, it is possible he may live to hang. Physicians say that there is no hope for Remset, Hiebert or the two Kehler children. The others may possibly recover.

THE IOWA IDEA AGAIN

Governor Cummins Explains in Chicago What the Republicans of His State Meant.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—The thirty-first anniversary of Chicago's big fire was observed last night by banquets, given under the auspices of the Marquette and Lake Side clubs.

Governor Cummins of Iowa responded to the toast, "The Iowa platform and the Tariff." He said in part:

"We believe that to the doctrine of protection more than to any other principle tariff is the most important of the United States. It is the mission of the republican party to reduce them so that they will again be in harmony with the principle out of which they spring.

"Depend upon it, that capital will not imperil its rightful interest because it is asked to surrender its usury.

"It has been said by illustrious leaders of the republican party that a modification of the tariff is not a remedy for the trusts. I take this opportunity to say to the republicans of Iowa that they wholly agree with this view, and have not proposed to effectually repair the wrongs that are perpetrated by unlawful combinations by any readjustment or abatement of the tariff schedules.

"No thinking man can doubt that large corporations are absolutely necessary to carry on, with convenience and economy, the growing business of the world, and however great a corporation becomes, if it develops in a natural way, through the recognized laws of commerce and sagacity of its managers against the competition of others engaged in like business it ought not to be the object of disfavor or condemnation; on the other hand, it should be the subject of just pride and

"There has never been, and cannot be, a controversy with respect to the purpose and measures of protective duties. "There are but two forces that can be trusted to fix prices—competition, and the

regulation of organized government. The latter is wholly inadmissible, and we must preserve the former. It is, therefore, the high and imperative duty of the government to so adjust laws that there will not be the least possible motive for the destruction of competition."
