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BAPTISTS OF STATE

They Will Meet for Their Annual Convention at Owatonna Next Monday Evening.

"Evangelization" Will Be the Theme of the Week's Meetings—Outline of Program.

The annual session of the state convention of Baptists will be held in the First Baptist church of Owatonna, Oct. 13-17.

The theme of the meeting will be "Evangelization." The singing will be led by the chorus of the Owatonna Baptist church under the direction of Professor E. J. Owen of Pillsbury academy.

After words of welcome by Dr. E. B. Jones, pastor of the church, and a response by Carl Emerson of Minneapolis, president of the convention, the annual sermon will be preached by Rev. W. B. Riley of the First Baptist church of Minneapolis on the "Evangelization and the Success of the Church."

Tuesday the report of the state convention will be followed by a discussion of the evangelization of the state. Addresses will be given on the country fields by Rev. F. C. Whitney of Rochester and on city work by Rev. H. B. Steinhilber of the Woodland Park Baptist church of St. Paul.

Wednesday afternoon the various phases of the women's home and foreign mission work will be considered, and addresses will be given by Miss Katharine E. Barro, who has been working among the Klamath Indians at Saddle Mountain, and also by Miss Julia Austin, secretary of the Women's Foreign Missionary society of the Wednesday evening addresses will be given by G. F. Holt of Minneapolis on the "Cost of Evangelization," and Dr. J. B. Thomas of Chicago on "Our Country's Evangelization."

Thursday morning will be devoted to educational matters, with addresses by Dr. Emory W. Hunt, president of Denison university, Granville, Ohio, on "Education and Evangelization," and by H. D. Dunnell of Owatonna on the "Needs of Pillsbury Academy," and by Rev. R. C. Mosher of Albert Lea on "The Pastor and Education." The day will close with a reception by the faculty of Pillsbury academy to the visiting delegates.

The academy needs a boys' dormitory, money for which is now being raised. Thursday evening district addresses will be given by Dr. J. W. Ford of Pillsbury academy and by Rev. Joseph Clark, missionary on the Congo.

Friday morning the Sunday school work will be considered. Among other things we speak are Sunday School Missionary Ernest Fagenstrom, J. H. Irish and Rev. Messrs. M. Mether and W. J. H. Rust.

Friday afternoon the Young People will have their session, at which addresses will be given by Rev. F. E. R. Miller of Marquette, president of the state B. Y. P. U., by Rev. L. A. Cleveland of Minneapolis on the "Development of the Evangelistic Spirit." The convention will close Friday evening with addresses by Rev. R. L. Kettner, district secretary of the A. B. P. S., and by Rev. Dr. Hunt of Ohio.

It is expected that about 200 people will go down from the Twin Cities to Owatonna, and a special train over the Milwaukee road has been provided, which will leave Minneapolis at 2:30 and St. Paul at 3 o'clock.

VOTERS TO DECIDE

Proposition to Issue School Bonds Will Be Submitted at November Elections.

Democrats Want Mayor's Office Declared Vacant and Special Election Held.

It is now for the people to decide whether the city should issue bonds for the purpose of erecting new school buildings. At the general election on Nov. 4, the people will have the opportunity of answering the petition of the board of education for \$200,000 in bonds.

The school population is increasing so rapidly that it is impossible for the board to keep abreast of the times with the usual income from taxes. New school buildings are needed to provide accommodations for such pupils as are now housed in garrets and basements, vacant stores and other makeshift schoolrooms.
