

# FOOTBALL VARSITY WAKES UP

### Students Hold Enthusiastic Mass Meeting and Cheer Team and Coach to the Echo.

### Five-Dollar Rate to Iowa City Is Assured if 200 Persons Will Go.

Minnesota's defeat by Nebraska last Saturday, instead of discouraging the varsity students has only roused them to a greater pitch of enthusiasm. This morning the university chapel was packed with rooters who attended to demonstrate their loyalty to the team. Rousing speeches were made by President Kennel, and by the athletic board, by Professor F. S. Jones, one of the faculty members of the board, and by several students.

The students cheered the name of Dr. Williams to the echo. President Kennel said that the mass meeting had been called, not to determine whether the students were loyal to the team and the athletic board, but that a fact of fact there was no question in the minds of the varsity men. "The purpose of this meeting," said the speaker, "is to demonstrate to the alumni and the public generally that the Minnesota students are unanimous in support of their eleven and coach."

Professor Jones quoted from the New Testament about the folly of discouragement over one reverse. Addresses were made by other students and members of the athletic board.

Excursion to Iowa City.

The enthusiasm of the students was evidently not fever heat. The Minneapolis & St. Louis road has promised a rate of \$5 to Iowa City and return for Friday's game, and a special train for the excursion, if 200 tickets can be sold. Manager Luby says that he thinks there is no doubt that the required number will make the trip. If less than 200 students go, the fare will be \$8.

The team will leave over the Minneapolis & St. Louis Friday night. The special sleeper which carries the eleven will be hitched to the excursion train, which will arrive in Iowa City about 7:30 Saturday morning.

Last night the squad, except those players who are on the hospital list, was worked hard for two hours behind closed gates. Davison was out in his suit and will take part in Saturday's game. His rest appears to have done him good, for he got into the plays with a good deal of ginger. O'Brien's knee is still stiff, but if he is needed he may play part of the Iowa game.

Van Valkenburg, in spite of his broken ribs was out yesterday, but took no part in the practice. He may be in the game again in time for the last three games of the season. The other members of the squad, though many of them are sore and stiff, are all in fair physical condition.

**KNIPS PRAISES MINNESOTA.**

Dr. Knipe, the Iowa coach, in an interview at Iowa City, expresses his opinion that Minnesota is stronger than last year, and says that Iowa must show 50 per cent improvement to beat the Gophers. This statement, however, seems a little extreme, and probably is due somewhat to Dr. Knipe's native modesty. Dr. Knipe said:

"Nebraska won, not because of, but despite, the game played by Minnesota. The latter eleven is much better than it was last season when it defeated us 16 to 0, and Nebraska is a lot better than Iowa to-day. Consequently there is nothing in the result of the game Saturday which will furnish basis for a reasonable prediction that Iowa can win from Minnesota.

"We have just one chance to defeat the Gopher team and that is a narrow one. Our team to-day is weaker in point of both defensive and offensive work, than the Minnesota eleven—and that means all departments of the game. We are much weaker in fact. It will take us 50 per cent improvement in our general team work to make a victory over the visitors possible. I can't predict that our team, or any team, will be able to make such all-around gain in four days. However, we three coaches intend to give the bunch the next few days the hardest practice it has ever had, and let them any possibility of developing the helping spirit and the general strength of the eleven in that time, we're going to do it. As it stands, I'll freely admit that our case is hopeless."

**IOWA TEAM PICKS UP.**

Iowa City, Iowa, Oct. 21.—Coach Knipe accomplished much with the Iowa football squad in the third week of practice, and there is a confidence in Iowa's ability to defeat the Gophers on Iowa field next Saturday.

The varsity has picked up wonderfully in speed and its attitude with the plays. New plays have been given them and they have been down to a place point. The new halfbacks give evidence of much greater ability to down the opposing runners than the old backs, Howell and White.

Maek is an especially apt pupil in the art of tackling the opposing runners, as he tries to surround the variety right end or skirt through the line of tackle. He makes exactly the willing sort of player that Knipe likes, and he probably develop him into a fine player before the end of the season.

Atkinson, at right guard, who tips the scales at 240 pounds; Roberts, at left end, and Captain Hollenbeck, the big center, all veterans of last year, are in the best of form and much is expected of them.

A brand new bunch of plays will be sprung by Iowa in one of the big games this year, in the Minnesota game. If necessary, if not, then in the Michigan game, two weeks later. They rest upon a new manner of calling upon the assistants of a player on the other side of the line from that on which the play is directed, and so quick is its execution and unceremonious in its direction that it has proven a wonderful success on the reserves. The reserve team, after going up against it one evening, practiced it on the varsity the next night.

The varsity could not stop it for fifty yards, though the men knew the signals and the place where the play was made. Hence, Coach Knipe figures that when the varsity tries it on another varsity team there will be something coming.

The thing that is bothering Coach Knipe this year, after that of getting the men on the jump every moment of the game, is the halfbacks on the defensive. Dr. Knipe still adheres to the end-close-in defense, playing the end in upon the opposing interference to break it up and leaving the halfback to tackle the runner.

This method of defense has worked well where the halfbacks were quick and good tacklers. Last year, however, the halfbacks on the defensive were the weakness of the team. Weiland allowed Rogers, of Minnesota, to go over Iowa's goal line without any interference to aid him, and every subsequent touchdown, nearly, was permitted because of the weakness of the halfbacks in tackling. Hence, the new halfbacks seem, this year, however, to have mastered their duties better. They are closing in quicker and thus get their man.

**KENTUCKY'S COMPLAINT.**

The Railroad Commission's War on the Southern Merger.

Washington, Oct. 21.—The interstate commerce commission has made public the complaint of the railroad commission of Kentucky against the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad company, the Louisville & Nashville railroad, the Southern Railway and the Southern railway in Indiana, the Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific Railway company, the Chattanooga Southern Railroad company, and the Chicago, Indianapolis & Louisville Railroad company, involving allegations of unlawful combination.

The complaint asks for an investigation of these roads by the commission, an examination of the contracts, agreements, etc., the production of books, papers, tariffs, contracts, the issuance of subpoenas for witnesses, an inquiry into the management of the roads; an inquiry as to whether their contracts, etc., constitute an unlawful combination, and a conspiracy to pool the rates of different and competing roads, and a device to enable the roads to divide the net proceeds of the earnings so as to equalize the earnings of each of them, and the general arrangements made on the commerce of the section involved.

The complaint says these roads cover all important railroad points and all railroad lines in the territory aggregating 25,000 miles, with an operating income of over \$30,000,000 annually, and charges that J. P. Morgan & Co. have secured practical control and management of the affairs of all of these lines.

It is alleged that the defendant companies have not filed with the interstate commerce commission, as required by law, copies of the contracts, agreements, etc. It is charged that such arrangements, combinations, purchase and sale for the producing of what is called a "community of interest" is simply an agreement or combination by which the rates on the roads named shall be pooled or controlled or routed so as to prevent competition.

This consolidation, joint ownership and joint control, it is charged, is simply to pool freight between the twin cities and in such proportion as those controlling or managing the combination shall designate and so destroy competition.

The interstate commerce commission will immediately notify all concerned of the complaint, and probably will arrange for a hearing not earlier than December.
