FLOUR FOR MANCHURIA

The Minneapolis Product En Route by Way of Suz.

Minneapolis flour is about to enter the Manchurian market. A shipment is now on the way east. If the results are satisfactory a market for hard wheat flour may thus be established. Flour is now shipped by the Washburn-Crosby company, for instance, as far east on the Mediterranean as the Suez canal, but hard wheat flour has not yet become an article of food in the orient, except in occasional families of the rich. The fact that Pacific coast soft wheat flour is being used in the orient is satisfactory to Minneapolis shippers, as otherwise it would enter into competition in England and other Minneapolis markets. The building up of a hard wheat flour business in new countries is slow, but once established it retains its hold...
