HEADED FOR COAST

North-Western Surveyors Are Running Extension of F. E. & M. V. Into Idaho.

Portland, Ore., Is Said to Be the Objective—Through Rich Mining Country.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 31.—Advices from St. Anthony, Idaho, say that a surveying corps of the Chicago & North-Western road has completed preliminary surveys for the extension of the line of the Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley from the northwestern part of Wyoming, to St. Anthony, Idaho. It is understood that the construction of the proposed extension will be begun in the early spring. From what is known it is believed that it is the intention of the North-Western to push on from St. Anthony to the northwest coast, touching at Portland and other cities of that section of the country. A line to Salt Lake City is also mentioned as among the possibilities. The railroad from Casper, Wyoming, will tap one of the most valuable mineral districts in the northwestern part of Wyoming. The proposed route of the North-Western follows the course of the White river for many miles and runs to the south of the Yellowstone park and the Jackson Hole country, one of the wildest spots known in the great west.

Articles of Incorporation of the Pillsbury-Watkins Company

Know all men by these presents, that we, the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves together as a body corporate, under and subject to the provisions of Title 24 of Chapter 33 of the General Statutes of Minnesota of 1902, and do to that end adopt the following:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be the Pillsbury-Watkins Company.

The object of this corporation shall be to purchase, sell, manufacture, own, hold, ship, sell and otherwise deal in any and all kinds of timber and any and all products thereof, whether such timber shall be growing, standing, felled or fallen; and to sell without the state of Minnesota, and within said state; and to that end, among other things, to purchase, own, hold, ship, sell and otherwise deal in, to sell and dispose of any and all kinds of timber lands, whether situated within or without said state; and to fell, cut and remove timber thereon at such times, in such manner, and by such instrumentalities as it may deem proper; and such timber or any part or parts thereof to convert into logs, lumber, poles, posts, ties or any other forms or any part or parts as may from time to time appear most expedient; and for the procurement, handling, manufacture and disposition of all such timber and products thereof; to purchase, construct or hire, maintain and operate, and to lease, and to have, in any state, any and all necessary or convenient mills, machinery, apparatus, supply stores, stocks of merchandise, yards, wharves, roads, and other facilities usual in or adapted to any part of the business aforesaid. The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be in the City of Minneapolis in said state.

ARTICLE II.

The time of commencement of said corporation shall be on the fifth day of November, A. D. 1902, and the period of its continuance shall be thirty years.

ARTICLE III.

The amount of capital stock of said corporation shall be one hundred thousand dollars; fifty (50) per cent of the value of each share thereof shall be paid to the Treasurer of the corporation ten (10) days after its first meeting, and the balance of such share shall be paid in full at such time or times as the Board of Directors shall require. Every such payment shall be so made when and to the amount of capital stock which shall then have been subscribed.

ARTICLE IV.

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject shall be two hundred thousand dollars.

ARTICLE V.

The names and places of residence of the persons forming the first board of directors are: William T. Watkins, residing at St. Paul, Minn.; Alfred F. Pillsbury, residing at Minneapolis, Minn.; Henry P. Watson, residing at Minneapolis, Minn.

ARTICLE VI.

The names of the first Board of Directors are: William T. Watkins, Alfred F. Pillsbury and Henry P. Watson.

The said William T. Watkins shall be the first President, the said Alfred F. Pillsbury shall be the first Vice President, and the said William T. Watkins shall be the first General Manager.

The government of this corporation and the management of its business shall be vested in a Board of three directors, each of whom shall be a stockholder, and, after the year 1902, be elected by ballot by the stockholders at an annual meeting at the office of the corporation in its principal place of business, on the second Wednesday in October in each year, and subject to such Board, in a President, Vice President and General Manager, who shall also be a Director, and shall, after the said year 1902, be elected by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting in each year immediately ensuing the annual meeting of the stockholders. At such annual meeting the Board shall also elect a Treasurer and a Secretary of said corporation, who shall respectively hold office during the pleasure of said Board, neither such officers nor such Treasurer need be a stockholder, and any person may at the same time hold both offices mentioned.

The Board of Directors may at any meeting thereafter fill any vacancy in their office by electing another person.

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The number of shares in the capital stock of this corporation shall be one thousand (1,000), and the amount of each share shall be one hundred dollars.

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Votes—At each meeting of stockholders, each share of the capital stock shall entitle the holder thereof to cast one vote in person or by proxy.

BY-LAWS—Subject to the right of the stockholders hereby conferred, the Board of Directors may establish any and all by-laws, rules and regulations not contrary to law, and amend, modify or repeal the same or any thereof, as shall be by said Board from time to time deemed expedient for the management of the affairs of said corporation.

TENTH—Except as hereinafter otherwise provided, every officer and director, whether hereinafter named and hereby appointed, or hereafter elected, shall hold office until the next annual meeting next after his appointment or election and until his successor shall be duly elected or appointed.

ELECTION PASSED—Should directors or officers named in these by-laws be deceased, appointed for an annual meeting, or any of them may be elected at a special meeting duly called.

Subpoena were served yesterday in Chicago on E. Boyd of the Rock Island, M. C. Markham of the Illinois Central, Darius Miller of the Burlington and J. V. Manthey of the western trunk line committee, to appear before the Interstate Commerce Commission at St. Louis. Complaint is made by the Chicago Live Stock Exchange that orders of the commission are violated by the western roads in the matter of live stock and packing house product rates. It is expected that the case will be taken to the supreme court if the commission reaffirms its ruling made in 1896 that freight rates on raw material should not be higher than those on finished products.

It is charged that the rate from Sioux City, Omaha, Kansas City and St. Joseph is such that packers can handle live stock at those points and then ship to the Atlantic seaboard at a cheaper rate than could be had if the live stock was shipped directly to Chicago and the slaughtering and dressing done at the Union stock yards. The complaint set out that this originates at points in Iowa, Missouri and Minnesota, east of the packing plants, and have to be hauled westward and then the dressed product hauled back to the same road on its way to the Atlantic coast.

Rates for Minn.-Ill. Game.

The Western Passenger association announces for the season of 1902 that it will game a special rate for the round trip from points within a radius of 100 miles of Minneapolis one far and one-third. The same rate will be made for the Wisconsin and Minnesota tickets for the first will be sold Nov. 8 and will be good till Nov. 10; for the second, Nov. 15, good till Nov. 17.

Enter Great Lakes Coal Trade.

Guffey & Queen, well known oil producers, have prepared to enter the great lakes coal trade next spring. The Great Lakes Coal company with \$5,000,000 capital has been organized and fitted mines will be opened in the western part of the coal fields. Coal will be shipped at the opening of navigation to Conneaut Harbor over the Pittsburgh, Bessemer & Lake Erie road. A fifty-eight mile line will be built from Erie, Pa. to New Ashland, Ohio, and the tract. It is expected that this line, the Western Alleghany, will become a link in the Pennsylvania system to relieve the Pittsburgh district freight congestion.
