The Earlier Reports. New York, Nov. 5.—Governor Odell has been re-elected governor of New York by a plurality of 11,004, the legislature will again be republican by a majority of about forty-six on joint ballot, which insures a republican successor to Senator Platt.

Among the democratic congressmen elected in New York county are W. R. Hearst and Francis Burton Harrison, son of Mrs. Burton Harrison, the writer.

Two of the democratic candidates in the state were successful according to the latest returns. Judge John Clinton Gray of the court of appeals is acknowledged to have defeated William E. Werner, the republican nominee for the associate judgeship and John Cunneen's election to the office of attorney general is practically assured.

The election of two candidates from the party that has failed to choose its governor is unique in recent New York state contests. When the democratic nominated Judge Gray was elected to the office, it was expressed that the republicans had not seen fit to recognize the long and distinguished judicial services of the same candidate.

Just what Governor Odell's plurality will be it will take the fall returns to determine. It is estimated by the New York papers all the way from 6,000 to 14,000.

CALIFORNIA

The Contest Is Very Close With the Republicans Leading on Governor.

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—The latest returns from the interior of California indicate the election of the entire republican state ticket. The plurality of Dr. Farabee for governor is estimated at over 5,000 and the democratic managers do not concede his election.

Interest in the campaign centered in the contest for the governorship and the district attorney nominations.

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Although full returns have not been received, the success of nearly all the republican candidates is conceded. Of eight congressmen, five certainly, and possibly seven will be re-elected.

For congress, third district, complete returns from 97 out of 234 precincts give McCall 5,727; White, 3,208. Same in 1920 gave McKinley 7,432; Bryan, 5,393.

WASHINGTON

A Republican Plurality of About 10,000 Indicated.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 5.—The republicans have carried the state of Washington by a majority that may run as high as 12,000. Though the indications are that it will be nearer 10,000. The democratic state committee does not claim the election of any of its state ticket though insisting that the measure of the republican nominees is the belief that there is a chance for democratic control of the state legislature.

It is likely that Judge Hiram E. Hadley, nominee for justice of the supreme court will lead the republican state ticket. The three congressional nominees will run very close.

PENNSYLVANIA

The Republicans Have Something Like 150,000 Majority.

Philadelphia, Nov. 5.—The Pennsylvania delegation in congress stands: Republicans, 23; democrats, 4. George W. Mowell (dem.) defeated William Connell (rep.) in the tenth district. Connell succeeded in keeping Mowell off the democratic ticket but his name went on the ballot under the name of anti-machine and union party and returns today indicate Connell's defeat.

The republicans have carried the state by a majority for Pennypacker variously estimated from 150,000 to 175,000. In the legislature it is practically certain that the republicans will have a majority on joint ballot, which assures the re-election of United States Senator Penrose. The dispatches from Allegheny county confirm the earlier estimates of the success of the citizens fusion ticket. This will probably elect George Shiras over Congressman William Graham, but the republican strength of the delegation in congress will not be affected by this result.

ILLINOIS

Republicans Carry Cook County but Lose Their Sheriff.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Practically complete returns from Cook county give the republicans the entire state ticket, with the exception of sheriff and four county commissioners. Healy, the republican candidate for sheriff, was defeated by Barrett, democrat, by over 5,000 plurality.

The republicans elected their state ticket in Illinois by a majority approximating 50,000 for Fred A. Bussey, for state treasurer.

KANSAS

A Gain of One Republican Congressman Here.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 5.—The vote cast in Kansas was close to 290,000. It will be night before the exact result is known. Chairman Albaugh of the republican state committee says Bailey's plurality for governor will be close to 35,000. The republicans will have eighty members of the legislature, allowing them to elect a successor to Senator W. N. Harris (dem.). All seven members of the congressional delegation are republicans—a gain of one.

MASSACHUSETTS

Republicans Victorious—Socialist Vote Jumps 300 Per Cent.

Boston, Nov. 5.—Massachusetts yesterday elected a republican state ticket, a congressional delegation of ten republicans and four democrats, a state senate of 31 republicans and nine democrats, and a house of representatives of 155 republicans and three socialists. The total vote was the largest ever cast for governor, reaching approximately 390,000 against 386,100 for governor two years ago.

Leutenant Governor Bates, in being chosen governor, led Colonel William A. Gaston, the democratic candidate, by a plurality of 40 per cent in the party vote as compared with that given Josiah Quincy last year, and out an average republican plurality of one-half.

MICHIGAN

Governor Bliss, Rep., Has a Plurality of 32,764.

Detroit, Nov. 5.—The revised returns that are being received to-day show that the total vote for Bliss is 474,474 and for Durand, (dem.), 14,650, giving Governor Bliss a plurality of 32,764. Governor Bliss has 11,870 behind Fred M. Warner, republican candidate for secretary of state, according to the returns, which when completed will lower Governor Bliss' plurality a little more. It is expected, Durand made a particularly strong run in Wayne county which he carried by nearly 10,000.

OHIO

Tom Johnson Badly Injured by a Hostile 100,000 Majority.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 5.—With more complete returns, the republicans to-day say their plurality on the state ticket will approximate 100,000 and that the Ohio congressmen stand seventeen republicans to four democrats, as in the last congress. The plurality in all of the four democratic districts were greatly reduced and in the republican districts increased. The only changes were in the twelfth and thirteenth districts, and they offset each other. The democrats gained the former by electing Judge De Witt C. Badger over Cyrus Huling and lost the latter by the defeat of Dr. James A. Norton, who has been in congress many years. The plurality of A. H. Jackson over Norton was less than 400, but the result was not close in other districts.

WYOMING

Congressman Mendell Elected by 3,500 Plurality.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 5.—The republicans claim that Congressman F. W. Mendell has been re-elected by a plurality of about 3,500 and the entire republican state ticket by pluralities of 4,000. They assert that the legislature is overwhelmingly republican and credit the democrats with three members at the most. The substance of a statement of Republican Chairman Van Orsdel. INDIANA

Republicans Claim the State by at Least 30,000.

Evansville, Ind., Nov. 5.—Incomplete returns indicate a big republican victory in the first congressional district. Fenway will be returned to congress by a plurality of about 27,000. Vanderburg

county alone gives him more than 2,000 of that amount. The returns do not materially change last night's figures. The delegation in congress will remain as at present—nine republicans and four democrats. The republicans have carried this (Marion) county by a safe plurality and the legislature will be safely republican, but probably by a slightly reduced majority. This means the re-election of Senator Fairbanks. Republicans claim the state by at least 30,000.

MARYLAND

The Democrats Gain Two Congressmen Here.

Baltimore, Nov. 5.—In the third congressional district there is one precinct in dispute by the democratic nominee, but even with Big claims conceded, the republican candidate is elected by 100 majority, thus giving Maryland four republican and two democratic representatives to the United States senate. This promises to produce another deadlock over the election of United States senators at the next session of the legislature.

DELAWARE

Another Adickes Deadlock in the Legislature.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 5.—Elections of congressmen for members of the legislature in Delaware show that the state senate will send ten republicans and seven democrats.

The house will stand 16 republicans and 16 democrats, with one district undecided by reason of a tie vote. On joint ballot the vote will be 23 republicans, 23 democrats, one tie. Of the republican members it is conceded that eight are opposed to the election of J. Edward Adickes to the United States senate. This promises to produce another deadlock over the election of a slightly reduced majority. Both republicans and democrats are claiming the three congressmen but the chances favor the democrats.

UTAH

Apostle Reed Smoot to Be a U. S. Senator.

Salt Lake City, Nov. 5.—Additional returns received up to 9 o'clock this morning indicate a republican majority on joint ballot in the legislature of at least thirty-one. This ensures the election of Apostle Reed Smoot to the United States senate. The republican victory was almost complete, twenty-one of the twenty-seven counties being carried for that ticket. A 2 p. m.—Later returns from the more remote counties of the state indicate that Howell (rep.) for congress, and McCarty (rep.) for supreme court justice, are elected by majorities of at least 4,000. The republicans will have a majority on joint ballot in the legislature of at least 9 o'clock to-day. The republicans claim that Peabody is elected governor by 8,900 to 10,000 plurality, while the democrats claim that Stimson has a plurality of 2,500 over Peabody. The democrats will have a large majority on joint ballot in the legislature, insuring the re-election of United States Senator Teller. The house will consist of thirty-nine democrats, twenty-four republicans and two members who were on both tickets and the senate of twenty-five democrats, eight republicans and two populists. Both republicans and democrats are claiming the three congressmen but the chances favor the democrats.

COLORADO

Senator Teller Sure of Re-election—Congressmen in Doubt.

Denver, Nov. 5.—The result of the election as to the state was still in doubt at

39, which may be increased to 41. Even such democratic strongholds as Cache and Weber counties went heavily republican. The Salt Lake Telegram to-day prints an interview with Apostle Reed Smoot of the Mormon church, whose election to the United States senate a successor to Senator Rawlins seems assured. "While the returns are not complete," said Mr. Smoot, "there appears to be no doubt of the election of men who will sustain my candidacy." Asked if he would withdraw from the senatorial race in case his ecclesiastical position made him the object of further criticism by the national press, Mr. Smoot said: "No, I am an American citizen, and I know of no reason why I should not be elected."

MISSOURI

Fifteen Out of the Sixteen Congressmen Are Democratic.

St. Louis, Nov. 5.—While complete returns from all parts of the state have not been received, partial figures show the election of the democratic state ticket, a safe democratic majority in the legislature that will select a successor to United States Senator Vest and the election of fifteen democrats out of sixteen congressmen. Richard Bartholdt, who was re-elected to congress, was the only successful republican candidate. It is not believed that complete returns will change the result in any manner. The democratic majority in the legislature of the state and city tickets will be in the neighborhood of 7,000.

NEBRASKA

Republicans Elect Five of Six Congressmen and Their State Ticket.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 5.—The republicans have succeeded in electing five out of six congressmen from Nebraska. This is a gain of three republicans in the congressional delegation. The state republican ticket is elected. Mickey for governor ran behind his ticket. The democratic majority in the legislature of the state and city tickets will be in the neighborhood of 7,000.

WYOMING

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 5.—Republican majorities in Wyoming have surpassed all expectations. Mendell for congress will have 6,000 majority. The entire republican state ticket is elected by from 5,000 to 5,000. The legislature is overwhelmingly republican.

OVER 20,000 IN S. DAKOTA

The Republican Party Has Cleaned Up Practically Everything in the Sunshine State

It Has Probably Not Less Than 122 Out of 132 Members of the Legislature.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 5.—Partial reports from thirty-two out of fifty-three counties in the state give the republican congressional and state ticket a plurality of 16,580. There is no question that the reports from the remaining counties, some of which are republican strongholds, will increase the republican margin to 25,000. The majority is certain to be above 20,000. Republicans generally are greatly pleased over the defeat of Glass, the independent republican candidate for United States senate in Codington county, who received less than forty votes in that county. Minnehaha is the banner republican county in the state, with 1,400 plurality; Turner is second, with 1,300; Lawrence and Hutchinson follow with 1,000 each. Reports from the state are not complete, but those at hand warrant the republicans in still maintaining they have elected not less than 122 out of 132 members of the legislature.

Boies' Plurality in Dubuque.

Dubuque, Iowa, Nov. 5.—Dubuque county, four precincts missing, gives Boies 5,084; Birdsall, 3,221. Democrats estimate Boies' plurality in the county, 2,050. Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, Nov. 5.—The republicans carried the county. The only close contest was for county auditor, and Ridley (rep.) has a majority of 100. Fort Dodge, Iowa, Nov. 5.—The republicans have carried every office in the county. The vote is not more than two-thirds of that of last year. So far as can be learned, Judge Cannon has carried everything before him in this congressional district.

BRYAN'S PRECINCT

It Gave the G. O. P. Candidate for Governor 16 Majority.

Special to The Journal. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 5.—Mr. Bryan voted for the first time in the rural precinct of Normal. He came home yesterday from a campaign in the state and deposited his ballot before going to lunch. This precinct gave him 18 majority in 1900, but gave 10 republican majority last year. Yesterday it gave the republican candidate for governor 16 majority.

The front of the building was blown out by the explosion, which brought a number of citizens to the scene. The building was set on fire and the citizens were unharmed and the robbers escaped.

Elwood, Ind., Nov. 5.—Mrs. Susan Montgomery, aged 24, attempted suicide here yesterday by drinking a quart of gasoline. After swallowing the stuff, she attempted to set it afire by touching a match to her mouth, and mouth were horribly burned and she inhaled the fumes. She could not recover. Her act was caused by jealousy.

WISCONSIN IN LINE

Little Bob's Plurality According to Some Estimates May Be 45,000.

Congressional Delegation Will Consist of Ten Republicans and One Democrat.

Milwaukee, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from the city of Milwaukee give La Follette (rep.) a plurality of 2,533. Governor La Follette carried Milwaukee county by 4,507. The social democrats polled about 12,000 votes in Milwaukee county. The latest returns from the state, while far from being complete, show that Governor La Follette carried the state by a margin of 40,000 plurality and some estimates give him 45,000.

The congressional delegation complete is made up of ten republicans and one democrat. The returns from legislative districts indicate an overwhelming majority for the republicans, which means the probable re-election of United States Senator John C. Spooner.

No Doubt About Spooner.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Assistant Secretary Taylor of the treasury department has received the following telegram from Postmaster General Payne: "The State senate unanimously republican except one. The assembly is overwhelmingly the same way. There can be no doubt about Spooner."
