SNOW IN MOUNTAINS

Three Feet of It and Superintendent Egan Could Not Have Worked a Way Out.

Just a Chance He Is Safe in an Old Cabin—Kennedy in Charge of Search.

Special to The Journal. Kallispell, Nov. 11.—The rain and sleet storm prevailing in this section for two days has made search for Superintendent Egan very difficult. Ice formed as soon as the rain fell and the timber was coated for over an inch thick, making the trees so heavy that it was dangerous traveling through the woods. The snow in the mountains being about three feet deep and covered with a thick, heavy crust, also added to the danger to all who attempted a search.

Notwithstanding the difficulties and hardships to be encountered, Charles F. Buckley, an old engineer and woodsman, with a picked party of five men, left for Pyramid Peak, southeast of Lake Five several miles. It was their intention to locate an old cabin in that section. They took provisions with them, expecting to be absent three days or more, and it is possible to discover a clue to the missing man.

Word was received last night that from an old cabin about four miles from the peak could be seen a small, white, smoke-like mass. This cabin is known to have provisions stored there. Should Egan have reached this cabin, he undoubtedly could have been seen by the search party.

Much anxiety is felt awaiting the return of Buckley. Upon his return will hinge the effort of further search. Another party of twelve men, led by the Buckley rescuing party. They took with them provisions enough to last several days, and will cover the territory heretofore gone over and will extend in the direction of the old cabin to be ready to answer any signals from the Buckley party. The search party is expected to return to-day or to-morrow night.

The fact that it has snowed almost continually since Egan was last seen makes it impossible for him to work his way out, although he would have been able to reach the cabin before closed in. Assistant General Secretary W. H. Kennedy arrived from St. Paul last night and has taken charge of the search.

NEW HOPE FELT

Smoke Seen From Cabin Believed to Be a Good Omen.

Chicago, Nov. 11.—A telegram received last night by A. H. Egan, of this city, a brother of Superintendent E. P. Egan of the Great Northern road, who disappeared last Tuesday while hunting near Belton, Mont., has aroused new hope that the missing man is still living. The message was sent from Spokane, Wash., by Mrs. B. F. Egan, and reads as follows: "Smoke seen from cabin gives new hope. Party on trail."

"That is the best piece of news we have had since my brother disappeared," said A. H. Egan. "I think it possible that my brother was injured so that he was unable to return and that he is now being cared for at some camp or cabin. It may be from some such place that the smoke was seen."

THEY ARE DEFLATED

Morgan & Wright May Retire From Chicago.

New York Sun, Special Service. Chicago, Nov. 11.—Constant labor troubles and the decreasing demand for bicycle tires threaten to drive the Morgan & Wright company out of Chicago. The books of the firm are being examined at the order of the rubber trust, and if the experts report that business is no longer on a paying basis the plant will be closed permanently. Should this action be taken Chicago will lose the greatest rubber factory in the world, and the one in which the pneumatic bicycle tire was first produced in large numbers. Over 200 men, women and children would be thrown out of work. They are on a strike at present, and not a wheel in the plant is running.

Washington—It is said that John Lind will be the minority leader in the next house of representatives.

Albany, N. Y.—Anna Mitchell, aged 17, was assaulted and murdered. Fred Knapp, a farm hand, has been arrested.

New York—George Geriand, one of the oldest portrait painters in this city, is dead from diabetes, at the age of 75.

New Haven, Conn.—The brother-in-law of the solicitor general of the Philippines—a Filipino—will enter Yale law school.

Boston—Masagani, who was arrested for breach of contract, will sue his prosecutors for \$50,000 damages. He will resume his tour.

New Orleans—J. B. Weltman, representing a New York life insurance company, whose home is in St. Louis, was killed by an electric car.

Rochester, N. Y.—A member of a band of gypsies shot and killed Raymond Baker, aged 16, during a row between a gang of boys and the gypsies.

Quincy, Ill.—Maude Lillian Berri, prima donna of the Sultan of Sulu company, accidentally swallowed a small Swiss watch which she went to sleep holding in her hand.

Louisville—John McAtee, a railroad clerk, of Louisville, who is reported to have committed suicide in Kansas City, was the last of an unfortunate quartet of young men each of whom took his own life.

Chicago—Mrs. Carter H. Harrison, wife of the mayor, has become the recipient of a decoration at the hands of Edward Noyes, president of the board of directors of the city of Chicago for her work in advancing the interests of the Alliance Francaise.

Bloomington, Ill.—John Werner, a wealthy farmer living near Mason City, filed a charge of shot into his heart. He was suffering from pneumonia and died. He was past 70. He leaves a wife and five children.

Chicago—Tearing open the wounds which he had inflicted a few hours before with suicidal intent, Detective Edward Niland, of the South Englewood police station, died last night at the Englewood Union hospital. Boston—Before the Economic club of Boston its annual banquet President Bill of Harvard denounced the labor unions of the country as opposed to the education of young men. He also opposed the use of force in the settlement of many industrial disputes. In closing he characterized the strike breaker or "scab" as the man called him, as a "good type of the American son."

Lexington, Ky.—Two of the most sensational affidavits ever filed in a Kentucky court have been filed at Jackson, Breathitt county. That county is the scene of a feud which has killed and within its borders thirty men have been killed this year.

THE TEACHERS ARE DIVIDED. McWhinner, chancellor of Palmer university, gave out information yesterday that while he was in New York last summer the late Francis Palmer contracted with him to donate \$100,000 to Muncie college, provided another \$100,000 was raised by the college officials. This contract was placed in writing. The conditions have been fulfilled and McWhinner is preparing to present his claim for \$100,000. This donation was not mentioned in Mr. Palmer's will, but will be contested for if necessary.
