THE POST ON LIND

The Washington Paper Discusses His Possibilities as a Democratic Leader.

McClellan of New York Also Considered a Coming Possibility.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The Washington Post to-day discusses Congressman-elect Lind saying: "The likelihood that ex-Governor Lind of Minnesota may come forward as a prominent democratic leader in the next congress is being discussed in some quarters. Of course, there are too many democrats of several terms of service to allow the north star state luminary to beat off a nomination for speaker by the minority, which generally carries with it the title of minority leader. However, that is not an ironclad rule, and the democratic nominee might nominally be the minority leader, while the real leader could be some other, who dominates by the sheer force of his individual powers. Governor Lind has served several years in the house and is not a stranger to the ways of legislation. He is a good debater, and can hold his own in the rough and tumble of an oratory which so often prevails in the chamber."

INSURANCE MERGER

A Suit to Restrain It Comes Up in New Jersey.

New York, Nov. 11.—The suit brought by William Robothan and John Hillingworth of Newark to restrain the merger of the Prudential Life Insurance company of America and the Fidelity Trust company, came up before Vice-Chancellor Stevenson in Jersey City to-day. The plaintiffs claim that the Prudential company has no right under its charter to merge with the Fidelity Trust, which has no legal right to enter into the scheme, because as alleged, it has not been duly incorporated for five years as the law requires.

BOLIVIA TAKES A HAND

The Whole Country Is Placed Under Martial Law—Many Rumors Are Afloat.

La Paz, Bolivia, (via Taconca, Chile), Nov. 11.—Citizens of this city were astonished Saturday evening when government officials posted throughout the town placards which declared the whole republic of Bolivia under martial law owing to the country being in a state of anarchy. The decree caused intense excitement because of the unexpectedness of the announcement and ignorance of the reason for the government adopting such a step.

BYLAW IN DANGER
