

A BILL ON TRUSTS

The Administration Is Still Considering Material for Such a Measure.

The Attorney General Thinks That the Sherman Law Should Be Amended.

New York Sun Special Service Washington, Nov. 13.—President Roosevelt and the department of justice are preparing to suggest a program in case the leaders of congress are willing to bring up the subject of trust.

Clerks from the department of justice have for some time been engaged at the capitol in making copies of all the bills ever introduced in congress relating to trusts.

Whether Mr. Roosevelt will recommend to congress that some action on the trust question be taken at the coming session cannot be said.

It is known to be the notion of the attorney general that the measure which the administration is seeking to apply is found in amendments to the present Sherman law which shall make it possible to reach organizations engaged strictly in production within the limits of a state.

CHOLERA AGAIN

Manila, Nov. 12.—Cholera made its appearance yesterday among the men of the detachment of the Fifth infantry which is stationed here.

AMERICANS IN A FIGHT

One Killed and Three Wounded in a Colombian Naval Battle.

Panama, Nov. 12.—The first American casualties as a result of the revolution occurred Tuesday.

The government warships headed for the place, and, on arriving there, the Bogota (formerly the Jessie Banning), manned by an American crew, commanded by Captain Armada, towed two boats with armed men.

One of the schooners, the Helvetia, was killed last night. The crew of the Helvetia, and two winding Gen. Walker, who was shot through the legs.

A man named "R. Kain" has been mentioned in press dispatches as being one of the crew of the Helvetia.

FOUR TOWNS DESTROYED

The Volcanic Damage in Guatemala More Serious Than First Reported.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—President Cabrera of Guatemala has resorted to the most stringent means to prevent particulars of the extent of the damage done by the Santa Maria volcano from reaching the outside world.

News received to-day by the Pacific mail steamer Newport confirms the report received last Sunday of serious damage on the morning of Oct. 25.

Americans in Champerico said the towns of Palmar, San Felipe, Colombia and Cotepeque had been destroyed, with probably great loss of life.

When the Newport was at Champerico the officers found the people of that port panic-stricken.
