Ashland, Wis., Nov. 24.—The Wisconsin Central ore dock was completely destroyed by fire late Saturday afternoon. The loss is about \$25,000. In falling, the dock carried with it a number of firemen and dockmen.

A Long Lost Husband Returns After Thirty Years.


