He Seems to Think the U. S. Will Help Venezuela as Against Europe.

The Revolution Is Said to Be About Over—Peace by Jan. 1.

Caracas, Nov. 25.—President Castro in an interview to-day said: "The revolution received its death blow at La Victoria. In spite of superior numbers the rebels were defeated and their principal leader was compelled to seek refuge in a foreign land. The remnants of his forces under arms are unable to support each other and are being closely pursued. I receive news daily of the disintegration of Matos' followers. "A campaign has been inaugurated against Barcelona and Ciudad Bolivar by a strong and seasoned army, which assures its success in the near future. "The battle of La Victoria was responsible for this satisfactory situation. It was the most stubbornly contested combat of my career. By the first of January I am confident I shall be able to officially proclaim peace. I cannot imagine that Matos will continue the revolution. Whatever efforts he may make will be futile and as a man of intelligence he must recognize that the sentiment of the people is against him and for peace. The support which he had six months ago he cannot command to-day. The friends of Matos appreciate that his purse strings were loosened only by great effort and that he is not likely to spend more money on the movement. "The government is resolved to execute in spirit and letter its directions contained in the proclamation of Nov. 3 and to be liberal and magnanimous to its opponents and the latter can have no reason to refuse it their loyal assistance. The government is disposed to forget the past and look forward to the future, which is bright with promise of peace and national and individual benefits and their accompaniments. "Following the declaration of peace the government will discharge its just obligations and improve its condition and reorganize the fiscal system of the country. Every effort will be made to attract foreign capital which is needed to exploit the rich agricultural, commercial and industrial resources of Venezuela. We trust the United States will participate in this exploitation. There will be ample guarantees for the security of funds invested. "Venezuela entertains cordial and sympathetic friendship for the United States and desires the closest relations with the United States which has already signally opposed the aggression of foreign powers. The government is confident that, convinced of the justice of our cause, the United States will give us the assistance in her future difficulties. Well supported and well applied the Monroe doctrine is of the greatest possible importance and the motto of the United States should be accepted by the Pan-American nations which should be bound in indissoluble ties of comity and friendship. Questions with European government can be settled amicably if they have the same desire for friendly relations. We, the Venezuelan people, united, patriotic and courageous form a force which will tenaciously resist any attempt to infringe our sovereignty or invade our territory. "With respect to Colombia, the government of Venezuela is advised that there has been another invasion of our territory from that country, the seventh in three years. It is our earnest desire to avert war with Colombia and we are prepared to arrange for a settlement when peace is declared and the courts resume their functions. "The government will not interfere in the asphalt or other similar cases. They will be settled in the light of the law and according to the facts. "Venezuela will participate in the St. Louis exposition."

PRIOR'S NEW CABINET Heads of Departments Selected in British Columbia. Victoria, B. C., Nov. 25.—Colonel Prior, the new premier, filled his cabinet when D. M. Eberts, the attorney-general in the Dunsmuir government, accepted that position in his administration, and W. B. McInnis of Nanaimo, became president of the council. The prior cabinet is as follows: Colonel E. G. Prior, premier and minister of mines; D. M. Eberts, attorney-general; J. D. Prentice, finance minister; W. C. Wells, commissioner of lands and works; Dennis Murphy, provincial secretary and minister of education; and W. B. McInnis, president of the council. Eberts and McInnis will be sworn in to-day.

BUY PINE IN THE SOUTH. Minneapolis, Wisconsin and Michigan Men Make Some Enormous Purchases in Alabama. Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 25.—More than half of Walker county, Alabama, and two-thirds of Winston county are involved in a lumber deal of gigantic proportions, which has been engineered since the first of the month and the details of which are now practically complete. About 30,000 acres of timbered land is included in the deal, and on it is a stand of about 1,000,000,000 feet of the finest yellow, long-leaf, short-leaf and deer-eyed pine in the south, all virgin. The men interested in the deal are J. C. Koehler of Minneapolis; Nell S. Brown, recently defeated for mayor of Milwaukee, Wis.; David A. Rose, an uncle of D. M. Rose of Milwaukee; Charles S. Gilbert of Wisconsin and Charles J. Winston of Minneapolis, with four men from Michigan. The company is to be called the Walker-

Winston Lumber company, with David A. Rose as president, Nell S. Brown as attorney and secretary, and Charles J. Winston as treasurer. A HUNDRED MILLION Amount Central Pacific R. R. Stockholders Want. New York, Nov. 25.—Papers in a suit to recover \$100,000,000 from the estate of the late Collis P. Huntington have been served on the executors in behalf of minority stockholders of the old Central Pacific railroad of California, represented by Walter Morehead of London. The action is described as an outgrowth of the investigation made by the Pacific railroad commission appointed by congress in the eighties. Collis P. Huntington and his associates and fellow directors, Leland Stanford, Charles Crocker and Mark Hopkins, known as the "big four," controlled the management. They organized, it is said, certain construction and equipment companies known as the Contract and Finance company, the Pacific Improvement company and several others, to which it is alleged they, as directors of the Central Pacific, gave con-

tracts for the construction, equipment and improvement of the road, turning over to the contracting companies in payment for the work \$30,000,000 in United States government bonds, which had been lent by the United States government to build the road, and practically all of the stocks and bonds of the Central Pacific railroad. The complaint sets forth that these securities amounted to \$163,000,000 and that all the work done cost only some \$60,000,000. The minority stockholders say that the difference of something over \$100,000,000 went to Huntington and his associates while they were directors of the Central Pacific railroad. The hearing has been adjourned until Dec. 2, when it will come on before Surrogate Thomas.

Washington, Nov. 25.—At the request of the council on both sides of the case brought to test the validity of the new constitution of Virginia, Chief Justice Richer will sit in the hearing Friday at Richmond on the application for a permanent order restraining the state board of can-

vassers from issuing certificates of election to the ten congressmen-elect.
