PUBLIC BATH PLANS

They Will Be Discussed by the Special Committee on Friday Afternoon.
Health Commissioner Hall Will Be Ready With Some Most Convincing Figures.

Chairman Dwyer of the special committee appointed to consider the proposition of converting the old city hall into a public bath-house, has called the committee to meet next Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the main committee room at the city hall. The matter of a public bath-house will be thoroughly discussed at this meeting, especially by Health-Commissioner P. M. Hall, who will come prepared with a great deal of information and strong arguments in favor of his plan.

Boston, which has twenty or more large bath-houses on the seashore and on the Charles river, is probably better supplied with public baths than any other of the large cities and Dr. Hall is reading up on the reports of the bath commission of that city. The city had, in 1910, in addition to the summer bathing places, one all-season bath-house and also some public gymnasiums with bath attachments.
