SAME OLD STORY

Letter From Spain for "Dear Cousin"—Daughter and Money, as Usual.

MORRIS, MINN.—W. D. Blessington, whose home is in Early, Iowa, and who is here looking after his farming interests, received very singular letter from an alleged cousin in Madrid, Spain.

The author of the letter, in language part French and part English, says he was one of the promoters of the fraudulent "Panama" canal, and that after the exposure he managed to make his escape to England. He has an only daughter, about 18 years old, whom he left in France to be educated. After being in England for some time he sent her to join him for a season and she came to England, but just before their meeting some detectives discovered his identity and arrested him.

His reason for writing Blessington, he says, is his solicitude for his daughter, who has been taken back to France and placed under the protection of a Catholic priest there—a friend of her father. He desires to place his daughter in the care of a guardian, and has offered \$50,000 of government bonds secreted in a vault known only to himself, and he promises W. D. Blessington \$10,000 of the same, if he will consent to accept the girl and the priest will stay immediately for this country and Mr. Blessington is to meet them in New York city.

The French cousin's intimate and definite knowledge of their family affairs leads Mr. Blessington to give credence to the communication, though it seems Quixotic, and so he has sent a letter stating that he accepts the charge as desired and he expects in the course of a week or two to receive a cablegram to go to New York.

GOOD YEAR FOR FERUGS FALLS

\$300,000 Expended for New Buildings—Much Winter Work Planned.
