"BIG NINE'S" WORK

The Conference Declines to Expand - Nebraska's Petition Denied - Change in Rules Criticized.

Minnesota's Schedule for Next Year

Includes Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois-Michigan Here.

Chicago, Nov. 29.—The "big nine" conference adjourned last evening after a prolonged session in which the applications of Notre Dame and Nebraska for membership in the conference were turned down, and Earl Schreiber, the former Wisconsin fullback, was refused reinstatement.

Professor C. W. Clemens of Nebraska

presented the petition of that university and Professor D. T. Murphy of Notre Dame spoke for his institution. Nebraska pleaded that the Missouri valley was not represented in the conference and that some such representation was needed.

Schreiber Makes Threats.

"Stagg is the man to blame for this," he said. "He is the one who knocked me in the conference and will make him smart for it if it is the last thing I do. I have played against some of his football men, I know their records and I will make it my business to see that every point of evidence against any maroon football player is brought into public view."

The question of allowing baseball players

to play on semi-professional teams in the summer was discussed at length and referred to a committee consisting of Chicago, Indiana and Illinois men. The committee will submit its report to the institutions composing the "big nine" for a final vote.

Eligibility Rule Amended.

Rule No. 4 in the conference eligibility list, defining the use of athletic skill for gain, was amended to read: "No person will be eligible who takes part in a contest where a money prize is offered, regardless of the disposition of the prize."

Many of the football men who gathered

about the Victoria hotel yesterday criticized the work of the conference in no doubtful terms. Ex-Minnesota captain and former coach of the famous "hunches," expressed the opinion that the rules might be much simplified and made more effective than they now are.

"I would suggest," said McCutcheon,

"that four simple rules be substituted for all this lengthy code the conference has adopted: First, no student to play on any athletic team until he has a year's residence at the college. Second, limit the period of eligibility to four years in line with the present rule. Third, prohibit any athlete from accepting money for his services on any of the varsity teams. Fourth, requiring athletes to maintain a certain standing in their classes."

Professor Jones of Minnesota introduced

at the conference a tentative list of a set of rules similar in purport to those suggested by McCutcheon. This set of rules included the provision requiring one year's residence to secure the eligibility of an athlete. It was not expected by Minnesota, however, that the proposition would be given serious consideration and none of the Minnesota representatives was surprised when the changes were turned down.

NEEDS OF THE NAVY

Secretary Moody's Annual Report Shows the Want of More Officers and Men for the New Ships.

Washington, Nov. 29.—In his annual report as secretary of the navy, Mr. Moody says: "The task which is employing the highest energies of the navy and receiving the greatest attention from the heads of the department, the commanders in chief of stations, the commanding and subordinate officers of squadrons, divisions and single vessels everywhere, is the work of training. The schools of instruction have been established wherever practicable. It is needless to say that the purpose of all this instruction and training is to make the navy fit to meet the emergency of any instrument of warfare. The navy serves many useful purposes in times of peace which should by no means be minimized. The naval service is a practical thing like its present form if the possibility of war were not in contemplation. It is believed to be the duty of the department to employ the means which congress has placed at its disposal to develop every latent power of material and see that all branches of the service operate in intelligent harmony."

At the close of the last fiscal year

there were under construction for the navy, by contract, the following vessels: Eight battleships, six armored cruisers, nine protected cruisers, four monitors, thirteen torpedo boat destroyers, seven torpedo boats and seven submarine torpedoes. The total number of vessels upon these vessels, particularly those of the larger class, has not been found to be satisfactory. The battleships were, on the 30th of June, 1902, from ten to twenty-nine months behind contract time; the armored cruisers, from four to thirteen months; the protected cruisers from six to eighteen months; while the monitors were from sixteen to nineteen months in arrears.

TOBACCO BRONZE.

Bristol, R. I., Nov. 29.—It is strongly believed in Bristol that the new cup defender will be built of tobacco bronze, as were the Vigilant, the Columbia and the Constitution. The main argument for the belief is that this metal has demonstrated its usefulness and there is no reason for the change.

TO BE USED IN BUILDING DEFENDER—Lipton Buys Our Blocks.

The department has recently taken steps to remove, as far as practicable, any element of delay which it can exercise control, and has notified contractors that they will be held to accountability for construction of the Defender. The failure shall occur, and particularly for any delays which may at any time be caused by the contractor, shall be given to private or public work.

CONTRACTS AWARDED.

The contract for the construction of the other battleship, the Louisiana, has been awarded to the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co. of Newport, Va., in competition, for \$2,990,000. The specifications for these two battleships, the most powerful yet laid down by the navy; call for a displacement of 18,000 tons, a main battery of four 12-inch, eight 8-inch and two 7-inch breech-loading rifles, and a secondary battery of twenty 3-inch 14-pounder rapid-fire guns, twelve 3-inch 12-pounder rapid-fire guns, and two 14,500-ton armored cruisers, the Tennessee and the Washington, are completed. Bids for their construction will be opened Jan. 6, 1903.

The results of experiments in the use of oil for fuel are given, and they are favorable.

During the past year 225 tons, chiefly of large caliber, have been manufactured at the naval gun factory, making a total of 1,210 guns thus far made; that establishment, the manufacture of armor has progressed satisfactorily, 7,612 tons having been delivered at various shipyards during the past year.

The appropriations for the fiscal year 1902, exclusive of public works, were \$1,184,895,939. From this \$30,137,169.75 has been withdrawn, leaving a balance of \$1,154,758,769.24.
