Repub. Aldermen Reconsider Their Plan to Distribute All City Patronage Themselves.

Some of the Street Commissioners' Offices Are Already Decided—Friction in the Second.

Thirteen street commissioners have been worrying for some time, along with certain other city officials whose positions depend on the aldermen, over what after Jan. 1 they have chosen to do with the city. They are sure of being cast out; William Knight of the tenth, and H. T. Ness of the eleventh, because they are republicans, James A. Gorman of the thirteenth ward, who knows he is to be dropped and is said to be rather thankful that it is no worse.

There has been more or less debate on the proposition to give the democrats nothing but the republican majority, Knight and Ness would have been retained if they are both very ardent men, but the aldermen who, a month ago, so strongly favored cutting off all patronage from democrats, have very little to say now except to argue against their former position.

It is stated that there would be a great deal of disorder if the council should place republican street commissioners in any of the four wards and the council.

HELLO LINE TO WINNIPEG First Message Congratulatory Word From Journal to Superintendent of Winnipeg Office.

The Northwestern Telephone Exchange company opened up its new long distance line to Winnipeg this morning, and one of the first conversations held over it was a message of congratulations sent from 'The Journal' to F. G. Walsh, district superintendent of the Canadian Bell Telephone. The wires worked admirably, despite the storm of the night before. Every word was clear and distinct. So, it could be told from this end of the line, Mr. Walsh might have been only a few feet away instead of sitting in the office in the Canadian city nearly 500 miles distant.

The new lines run through Fargo, Grand Forks and Neche, the stretch from Neche to Winnipeg having been constructed by the Canadian company. Through it Winnipeg has been placed in telegraphic communication with all the cities of the north and west in Canada, and the completion of the line has been hailed with delight by Winnipeg business men.

Street Railway Keeps Its Lines Open—But Railroad Trains Are Delayed Somewhat.

Aside from a few scattering telegrams in the evening by roundabout routes, Minneapolis and the entire northwest were cut off from communication with the outside world by the storm which raged throughout the Mississippi valley last night and this morning centered at Dubuque, Iowa, where the wires were all cut. Street-car traffic at a standstill.
