IN ROBBINS' PLACE

George L. Matchan Believed to Be Booked for Surveyor General of Logs.

F. G. Warner of St. Paul Regarded as the "Comer" for the Oil Inspectorship.

Rumor says that there will be a change in the office of surveyor general of logs and lumber for the Minneapolis district next April, when the two-year term of A. B. Robbins expires. The man believed to be slated for this position is George L. Matchan, chairman of the republican county committee. Mr. Matchan has managed two county campaigns, giving up his time for the work for practically six months on each occasion, and as far as party service goes, he has earned recognition. It was thought that he would be rewarded two years ago, but in the distribution of the plums it was found there were not enough to go around, and Chairman Matchan was left out. The impression prevailed during the campaign that he was to succeed Fred Schifftman as state oil inspector, but Mr. Matchan did not send any delegations over to plead for that position. Under the new law it will only be worth \$2,400 a year after Jan. 1, and is not particularly attractive to a man who has other business. The surveyor generalship is something really worth while. It is believed to bring a net income of \$5,000 a year. While no particular fault is found with the present incumbent, it is thought that the good thing will be passed around, and that Mr. Matchan is "comer."

St. Paul will probably get the oil inspectorship. At least St. Paul republicans are proceeding on that assumption, and have four candidates for the place—the only ones in the field up to date. Penton G. Warner, formerly chairman of the county committee, and candidate for the majority last spring; W. H. Johnson, retiring county auditor; J. J. Leighton, another ex-mayorality candidate, and C. J. Nelson of the first ward, were the four candidates for the place—the county committee and is believed to stand the best chance. A delegation of sixty waited on the governor yesterday to request that Judge Finck, throughout, one of the spokesmen, dwell on the fact that Ramsey county republicans had made a winning fight this year against the influence, and were more entitled to reward than they were two years ago.

As far as present indications go, these are the only change heads. The heads of departments under the governor all have excellent records, and there are no candidates out against them. There seems to be no question of their reappointment.

HOME GROWN PINE SEED

Secretary Andrews of the Forestry Board Thinks He Can Save Money.

General C. C. Andrews, secretary of the state forestry board, is now at work upon a circular detailing the correct method to collect and prepare white pine seed. He can furnish to request certain denuded sections of the state and when General Andrews looked the matter up he discovered that seed, such as is required, has been imported from Germany and Denmark heretofore, at a cost of \$5 a pound. This would make the project a very expensive one and the general hopes to be able to secure the seed on this side. The cones should be collected in December and then heated until they fall apart, allowing the seed to fall out. The operation is simple and pays well.
