A BILL FOR PUBLICITY

The First Anti-Trust Measure as It Appears in the Judiciary Committee.

Washington, Dec. 6.—The publicity bill for trusts as reported to the full judiciary committee by a subcommittee yesterday provides that every corporation, joint stock company or similar organization engaged in interstate or foreign commerce, and every such corporation which shall hereafter be organized, shall file with the interstate commerce commission, on or before Sept. 1 each year, a return stating among other things its name, date of organization, where and when organized, the statutes under which organized, and, if consolidated, the names of the constituent companies and the same information concerning them. If the concerns have been reorganized, the original corporation or corporations is to be stated, with information concerning them.

It also is provided that the amount of authorized capital stock, shares into which divided, par value, whether common or preferred, and distinction between each, amount issued and outstanding, amount paid in, how much, if any, paid in cash,

and how much, if any, in property, and if in paid property, a description and cash value of the property at the time it was received in payment shall be stated. The indebtedness, its nature and for what purpose incurred is to be given, also a statement of the assets at their present market value, giving the elements upon which the market is based.

It also is required that the total earnings and income, operating expenses, interest, taxes, permanent improvements, net earnings, dividends declared, with rate and date during the year preceding the first of the preceding July, salaries of officials and wages of employes be disclosed.

It is provided further that the treasurer or other officer of concerns affected by the bill having requisite knowledge shall answer on oath all inquiries that may be made in writing, under the direction of the interstate commerce commission, relative to its financial condition, or its capital stock. Such an answer is not to be used as evidence against the person making it, except in prosecutions under the proposed act.

A tax of 1 per cent per annum is imposed on so much of the capital stock outstanding which is not fully paid in cash or other property at its full cash market value, and provision is made for collecting the tax.

Any concern contemplated in this bill failing to make the return as required under this bill, and any concern failing

to pay a tax imposed, is to be restrained on the suit of the United States from engaging in interstate or foreign commerce. It is made the duty of the attorney general, at the request of the interstate commerce commission, to enforce the provisions of the proposed act, and suit may be brought in any district court of the United States, at the election of the attorney general, where an offending concern has a place of business.

Provision is made that the interstate commerce commission shall prepare and publish a statement showing a list of corporations and disclosing their condition. The bill does not apply to any concern the amount of capital stock of which does not exceed \$500,000.

J. J. HILL'S ORIENTAL RATE

It Gives the Pacific Mail People a Shock—San Francisco Is Stirred.

The Pacific mail company intends to fight for the business and is now endeavoring to get a fair carrying rate from the government. Mr. Hill, it is understood, has made an offer of forty cents a hundred pounds from Chicago to the Orient. It is difficult to see how he can make money at that low figure. The people of San Francisco are up in arms over Mr. Hill's movement and will make efforts to back up the Pacific mail.

Point a Peire, Gaudeloupe—Mont Pelee, on the island of Martinique, has resumed its dangerous activities. The volcano is emptying ashes which rise as high as five miles.

New York—Several vessels were wrecked during the storm last night. The Otter is ashore near here and the Scandia was abandoned off Hatteras. Some lives were lost.

Shrewsbury, Va.—Fifteen strong, the delegation of mounted police went to West Point to see the cadets ride to-day. The trip was a success and it may mark the beginning of a radical reform in the mounted police force of this city.

Chicago—Defeated and without a country, Francis William Butler, once secretary of the Transvaal Republic, arrived here yesterday. He says: "Chamberlain is a liar, and I will never live in a country ruled by a people who will elevate to position such a man."

Chicago—William Bristol was adjudged guilty of fraudulent use of the mails. Bristol was manager and secretary of the Surety Guarantee and Trust company, and is said to have defrauded John R. Prime, former adjutant general of Iowa, to the extent of \$1,500, and M. J. Adams, of Des Moines, Iowa, of \$1,000.

Anchorage, Ky.—As the result of their attempt to go to sleep in a truck, John Allen, Jr., the 6-year-old son of John Allen, is dead, and his 8-year-old sister is in a very serious condition. The boy proposed that they get into the truck and rest. After they had done so, the boy pulled the lid down and they were unable to open it.

St. Louis, Dec. 6.—Charles J. Denny, former member of the house of delegates, on trial on the charge of perjury, has been found guilty and his punishment fixed at two years in the penitentiary.

Denny is a millionaire brewer and a director in the Suburban Street Railway company. The only defense offered by Judge Krum, attorney for Denny, was testimony in behalf of the defendant's good character.

Butte, Mont., Dec. 6.—Doctor Charles Folgeson reported to the police last night that he had been robbed of \$5,000 in a certificate and about \$100 in cash. The robbery occurred in his room. Folgeson said he had been drinking and some man whom he does not remember, took him home. When he woke in the morning all his valuables, together with his vest, were missing.
