MRS. BURDETTE'S CREED

Home the Center but Not the Limit of Woman's Life.

In one of her recent club addresses Mrs. Robert J. Burdette formulated a club creed. It made so favorable an impression that she was requested to furnish it for reference and has done so. It reads as follows:

"I believe in afternoon club life for women.

"I believe in evening club life for men and women together when it does not rob the home of father and mother, and that does not emanate from the home and its final and best results return to the home. Home must always be the center but not the limit of woman's life.

"I believe in equal rights in the family for father and mother in intelligence, affection and filial respect. These the club should foster.

"I believe in nine-tenths of the club members doing the work and one-tenth the criticizing, instead of the reverse.

"I believe in individual responsibility for every interest and in mutual sympathy and appreciation of results.

"I believe no woman has any right to accept a place on any committee unless she serve faithfully, promptly, intelligently, and be willing to stand by the results of her individual action.

"I believe that women should have a moral responsibility regarding financial matters in the prompt payment of dues and pledges, and a comprehension that as no other phase of life can be carried on without money, neither can the enlarged club life.

"I believe in the value of a minute, and that thievary of time on the part of one late member from those in waiting is reprehensible. Railroad trains do not wait; why should immortal souls?"

"I believe, out of consideration for others, in removing the hat in all public assemblies.

"I believe in occupying the seat farthest

from the aisle when there are others to come, and, for the same reason, occupying front seats first.

"I believe that club members should restrain themselves from whispering or the rustling of skirts or papers during club sessions.

"I believe no woman should seek or use official position for recognition, or club affiliations for stepping stones, only, but that she should utilize her opportunities for the altruism of life.

"I believe the character and good name of each individual member of the club should be as sacredly guarded by all other members as are those of the family, and that the use of dishonorable political methods in club life for women will be the deathknell of pure, womanly organizations.

"I believe the golden rule for club women should be, Do right unto others, regardless of what others do unto you."

HIGH STATE OF MOTHERHOOD

Chicago Professor Believes Women Have Reached a Broad Plane.

Womanhood and motherhood are found in their highest and best forms to-day, declared Professor Herbert L. Willett of the University of Chicago before the Madison club of last week.

"Woman has so learned lessons from the Madonna that motherhood in its highest estate is characteristic of the woman of the present," he said.

"It is not the mother of her own child, but an children. These mother-needing children can be divided into two classes. First, a large class of the weak or resourceful mother, who has so many places to go and so much to do that the training of the child is left entirely to servants; second, the mother who is thrown out on the world, destitute, and alone. Every woman has a mother's instinct. A great force in developing this instinct is the woman's club with their work in philanthropy and reform."

Professor Willett believes in clubs. Such a belief, he maintains, forms a creed for a larger and better life.

"Men may have made the world," he continued, "but women inspired it. They have overcome ill by good. In this contest with the dragon of evil, that woman does the fighting while St. George sits near to see how things come out."

Every woman cannot be a Deborah, a Ruth or a Portia, he said, nor can she hope to inspire a Dante as Beatrice did, but she may continue as she has for ages, in giving to womanhood and motherhood the highest and best in her growing spirit of the world to-day.

CORNELL WOMEN PROTEST

College Students Would Exclude the Political Equality Club.

A granddaughter of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Miss Nora Stanton Blatch, is taking the civil engineering course at Cornell university. A political equality club was organized this fall and naturally she was the choice for president. The club is small and not likely to be offensive, but it has stirred up opposition in a faction which declares that the club has no proper place among the activities of the university women and must go. It will be interesting to watch what steps the opposition proposes to take to bring about the desired "going." If Miss Blatch has inherited the other family characteristics along with the belief in political equality.

"The Woman's Christian Association wishes to express its high appreciation of the labors of D. P. Jones, who by virtue of his position as president of the council became acting mayor of the city at a period of its history when a man of integrity and uprightness was greatly needed, and whereas Mr. Jones, by his intelligent grasp of the situation, by his fairness and ardor in his work, by his quiet and unostentatious manner has restored to our city good government; as far as was in his power he has reorganized the police force and put the restraint of the law about the saloons and kindred evils; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Woman's Christian Association does hereby express to Mr. Jones its high regard for himself and his hearty appreciation of his honorable and successful efforts and tender to him its sincere thanks for the good that he has done to the city."

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THE FIVE BRIBERS

St. Louis Enjoys the Sight of Their Trial.

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 16.—The selection of a jury for the joint trial of Charles C. Denny, Edmund Bersch, Charles A. Cutler, John A. Sheridan and T. Ed. Albright, former members of the house of delegates, on the charge of bribery in connection with the suburban bill, began to-day, after Judge Ryan had overruled the demurrer of the defendants' attorneys

and decided that the case must go to trial yesterday's session seven defendants were called for joint trial, the five named, and in addition, Julius Lehmann and Emilie Ahrmann.

Owing to Ahrmann's illness and the fact that Julius Lehmann already is under sentence to the penitentiary for perjury, the counsel for the defendants made urgent objections to the progress of the trial, finally filing a demurrer which Judge Ryan overruled this morning. The case goes to trial without Lehmann and Hartmann.
