# THEY ARE READY TO SETTLE IT

Leading Citizens of Caracas Want to Give Mr. Bowen Full Power to Do So.

Fears That Coercive Measures Will Follow the Establishment of a Blockade.

Caracas, Dec. 18.—It has been decided that the Venezuelan difficulty shall be ended, and the discussion of terms of settlement is now going on. United States minister Bowen undoubtedly will be one of the arbitrators. The government fears that coercive measures will follow the establishment of the blockade. The leading citizens of Caracas have addressed a joint note to President Castro, asking him to give full powers to United States minister Bowen to effect a termination of the present difficulty. This note was transmitted to President Castro at 1 o'clock yesterday. It is signed by all the leading merchants, bankers and agriculturists of Caracas. It reflects truly the concentration of opinion among the business element of this city. The men who signed the note met again last night to discuss ways and means of obtaining money with which Venezuela can meet her obligations, as well as the guarantees which it will be possible to offer to her creditors. The note was as follows: Caracas, Dec. 17, 1902.—To the President of the United States of Venezuela—Sir: The undersigned, having received from the government their aid to the government of Venezuela in the present conflicting situation, which has been created by the great power of Europe and Great Britain, and upon your request to give our opinions in writing, we address you in the following terms: In view of the acts of violence already committed and of the absolute impotence of Venezuela to meet force with force in reasonable or just manner, and in the present situation, and the government and people of Venezuela having complied honorably and worthily to the demands of justice, we consider, with all due respect that the moment to yield to force has arrived. We therefore respectfully recommend that full powers be given to the minister of the United States of North America, authorizing him to carry out proper measures to terminate the present conflict in the manner least prejudicial to the interests of Venezuela. The note is signed by about 200 prominent citizens of Caracas.

### A DECLARATION OF WAR That Is Considered the Best Way to Protect the Blockade.

Washington, Dec. 18.—From some source not disclosed the state department has heard that England and Germany are considering the advisability of declaring war on Venezuela or letting it be known to the world that such a war exists, this action being necessary to secure recognition of the blockade of the Venezuelan ports by the United States and other powers. Mr. Bailew's statement is that personally he thought the existence of a blockade meant a state of war is regarded here as confirming the state department's information, and it will not surprise him if the government has decided against Venezuela by Germany and England and possibly by Italy within a very few days. The United States will recognize a war blockade if it is effectively maintained. Until war is declared or known to exist, however, the government will insist on the right of American vessels to enter and to clear from La Guaira and other Venezuelan ports. An attempt by German or English warships to stop an American vessel from entering one of these ports under present conditions will be regarded as an act of war. It is expected to reach La Guaira on Saturday—would result in complications that might lead to serious consequences.

# NO DANGER AT ALL

Secretary Root Says There Was an Understanding With the Powers.

The United States Was Willing to See Castro Jumped On—The Cause of the Fuss.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, Dec. 18.—Speaking of the Venezuelan difficulty, William E. Curry, in a Washington special to the Record-Herald says: Secretary Root told the committee on military affairs the other day that among the best reasons between the United States, Germany and England made it impossible to become involved in the Venezuelan controversy. He was positive in his assertions that the several of the gentlemen present considered his language very significant and drew the inference that President Roosevelt was not unwilling to see Venezuela chastised for her sins provided her assailants made no permanent occupation of the country and did not interfere with our commerce. There isn't the slightest doubt that President Castro is a very bad lot, and that he is a danger to the country and an unreliable people in America. If evidence were needed to prove that fact it can be found in the Pantheon of Caracas, where there is a statue of the country's martyrs erected to the honor of national patriots, who, almost without exception were assassinated, imprisoned, driven into exile or were obliged to die of starvation by the very people to whom they were giving their lives. In the building where congress meets the walls of a large reception room are hung with portraits of the very people to whom the country owes nearly all of whom suffered a similar fate. The people of Venezuela have erected monuments to Simon Bolivar, their George Washington, in almost every town; they have named their counties after him; his coffin and his shroud and garments he wore are preserved with sacred care in the city of Caracas. His speeches, letters and other writings have been published in gorgeous style, but all this consideration was displayed after he had been driven from the country to starve in exile. No honest man, no patriot was ever able to enjoy honor and justice in Venezuela until after he was dead, and although there are a number of excellent men and noble women in the country who may be admired and trusted to any extent individually, yet collectively, as a race, as a people, they are entitled to no confidence. In the long line of presidents and dictators who have ruled over the country, very few have been legally elected, and very few have been able to distinguish between the public revenue and their private incomes, and usually been treacherous and tyrannical. I suppose these traits are in the blood, and perhaps are the result of training. No colony was ever treated more unjustly than Venezuela. For centuries the doleful cries of the people were the wailing of the victims of Spanish deception, cruelty and duplicity, and since they have been a republic their rulers have imitated these traits.

It was stated at the navy department that one reason for sending navy officers to Caracas was the fact that Mr. Bowen is almost overwhelmed with the work imposed upon him by his many changes. He has nearly all of the English residents in Caracas domiciled in the American legation and is feeding them from his own table. As for the torpedo boat destroyer, it is pointed out that it will serve as a dispatch boat to keep Mr. Bowen in touch with the nearest cable station to La Guaira, which can be relied upon to transmit messages to Washington in case the La Guaira cable is cut.
