FASTEST ON LAKE

Shevlin Is Constructing a Palatial New Steam Launch for Use on Minnetonka.

Will Be 60 Feet Long and Guaranteed to Make 15 Miles an Hour.

Thomas H. Shevlin, Jr., expects to have the largest, fastest and handsomest steam launch on Lake Minnetonka next summer.

The new boat will be 60 feet long, 10 feet beam, with accommodation for fifty passengers.

The steamer will be equipped with 60-horse power engine and will run by one propeller. The contract speed is fifteen miles an hour.

THINKS RULES ALL RIGHT GIVES UP HOPE OF PEACE

Julian Curtiss Believes no Change in Laws Governing Football Is Needed. President Pulliam of the National League Prepares for Another Year of War.

Walter Camp of the football rules committee was in New York yesterday and when asked concerning probable changes in the playing rules of the game said that if a majority of the players of the country favored changes they do not doubt would be made.

President Pulliam of the National League has, it is said, given up all hope of a peace conference between the two leagues and will now begin a fight against Ban Johnson and the American League.

The peace conference between the National and American league committees will be held in Cincinnati Friday, with all amalgamation schemes barred and the player question the only one to arbitrate.

Neither Ban Johnson nor President J. Hart of Chicago would talk for publication on the prospects for peace yesterday, but Johnson admitted that he had written Chairman Herrmann and expected a reply to-day.

It was learned that President Johnson in this letter asked for a meeting on Friday, in which amalgamation schemes should be cut out and the efforts be confined to an adjustment of the various claims for players and the consideration of contract jumpers.

The Northern baseball league held its final meeting at Fargo yesterday afternoon to close up business of last season. President Kent was empowered to name a committee to determine the circuit for this year and a number of applications will be considered.

"Billy" Keeler, the captain of the Brooklyn baseball team, whose left arm has troubled him during the last two seasons in consequence of which he was frequently compelled to lay off, had the X-rays put to the limb yesterday in the office of Dr. Charles W. Winters at New York.
