

TEXT OF THE BULL

Pope Leo Makes Some Striking Rulings Regarding the Philippine Church.

The Washington Government Much Gratified at the Text and Tone of the Message.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The text of the papal bull concerning the Philippines has reached this city...

But the fortune of war which changed the civil government of the country has involved changes in the spiritual government also.

For with the cessation of Spanish rule the right of patronage of the Spanish kings has also ceased and the church has come into greater liberty with the just partition of its rights from those of the civil government.

This language attracted keen attention among ecclesiastics, as it is the keynote of the apostolic constitution promulgated for the future government of the islands.

Wherefore to the archdiocese of Manila, the bull reads, "and to the dioceses of Cuba, Caceres, Neesegobla and Jara we add and institute the new dioceses of Lipa, Taguigaraon, Capizana and Zamboanga."

Speaking directly of the recent negotiations of the commission under Governor Taft, the pope says:

"Subsequently, to our satisfaction, the government of the United States of America sent a special legation to confer with the Holy See for the solution of some questions touching Catholicity in the Philippine islands."

The document does not deal directly with the future disposition of the friars in the Philippines...

"We do now by this present apostolic constitution make and publish the provision which shall be of the utmost importance for the church in the Philippines, with the hope that what we ordain by our supreme authority will, thanks to the equity and justice of the American government, be studiously and sacredly observed."

The secretary of war and the officials of the insular bureau are much gratified by the language and the evident purpose of the pontiff to second their efforts to solve the Philippine problem.

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THEY'LL BE KILLED

The New Orleans State Tells the President That Negro Appointees Will Be Assassinated.

Mr. Roosevelt Is Accused of Assuming the Role of a Czar—Very Plain Talk.

New Orleans, Jan. 6.—The New Orleans papers all comment in very savage terms on the action of the president in closing the Indiana postoffice because of the resignation of the colored postmistress.

"In discussing the Indiana incident, we do not believe it to be wise for either the people of the south or their newspapers to make words. President Roosevelt in closing the postoffice at Indiana has suspended the law for the deliberate purpose of offending and insulting the white people of the south, and incidentally to pander to the negro vote of the northern pivotal states."

"He has assumed the role of a czar for the sole purpose of cinching the presidential nomination, and it is well that the south should proclaim its knowledge of his motives, and also to impress upon the mind of the country the fact that if President Roosevelt is not ousted from office, he will be driven to the south by appointing and keeping in office obnoxious negroes, his negro appointees will be killed by the white people of the south, and the white people of the south will be driven to the north by the majority of the people in the southern states."
