Massachusetts, Mex.—There are forty-three plague patients at the Lazaretto and the disease is now attacking people convalescing from previous attacks.
El Paso, Texas—Francis O. Matillero, a native of Madrid and a famous banderillo, was killed here in a brief fight yesterday afternoon before 5,000 spectators, many of whom were Americans, and their wives.

Guthrie, O. T.—Governor Ferguson has interdicted the wearing of bloomers in basket ball games by girls in the state educational institutions.
Westerville, Ohio—Rev. B. E. Parker, principal of the Otterbein university business department, is in jail on the charge of fraudulent use

of the mails. Professor Parker was advertising for copies who should do work at home. He required a deposit of \$1 from each.
Moab, Utah—A small, active volcanic crater has been discovered by prospectors in the Douse plateau region near the Grand river, twenty miles north of Moab.
Washington—The sub-committee of the senate judiciary committee has agreed on the changes

to the Nelson bankruptcy law. Senator Nelson will manage the bill.
New York—On Aug. 10, 1842, Samuel F. B. Morse wrote in his diary: "The inference is that a telegraphic communication on my plan may, with certainty, be established across the Atlantic." Starting as this may seem now, the time will come when this project will be realized.
