San Francisco—J. Parker Whitney, Jr., son of a millionaire of Boston, dropped Whitney, his Miss Daisy Parrott, daughter of a San Francisco millionaire.

Orange, N. J.—Joseph Whipple Stekler is dead aged 90 years. In the past three years Mr. Stekler has given nearly \$200,000 to philanthropic objects in Orange.

Wheeling, W. Va.—Charles M. Schwab is a victim of locomotive accidents. He has been able to resume active duties at the head of the United States Steel corporation.

Austin, Texas—The committee in charge of the budget has incurred the undying hatred of three-fourths of the legislature by rolling that nothing but a budget will be made.

New York—William H. Kimball, former president of the Seventh National bank, and Gamaliel W. Rose, paying teller, were tried on charges of having violated the national banking law.

Chicago—Sir Philip Burns-Jones' "Vampires" may not be exhibited here as none of the art stores will allow the artist to show it in their places for an admission fee, as Sir Philip thinks it should be.

Washington—A. W. Barrett, brother of former Congressman W. B. Barrett of Massachusetts, committed suicide in the Ebbitt House. In a letter he laid his misfortunes to liquor and a married woman.

New York—As the result of blood poisoning caused by being bitten by a prisoner about eighteen months ago, Patrolman John T. Collins, a Brooklyn policeman, is dead. Collins was bitten on the hand by a desperate thief.

Honolulu—Prince Cupiki, delegate-elect to congress from Hawaii, will astonish Washington when he arrives in almost regal state. The Hawaiian legislature will be asked to appropriate \$10,000 to add to the money to aid in keeping up a princely establishment in Washington.

Mazatlan, Texas—The town council has bought land to entice the country. There were six new cases of plague and six deaths yesterday. House burning was steady and there was a feeling of consternation among the people and a few are in peril of losing their reason owing to the daily scenes of horror and desolation.

The President Speaks of Some of the Problems of the Twentieth Century.

Washington, Jan. 20.—President Roosevelt was the guest of honor last night at the banquet commemorative of the fiftieth anniversary of the Washington Young Men's Christian association and the International committee of North America. He said in part: "An old and favorite quotation of mine has been Wesley's remark when some one criticized him because his 'hymn tunes' were so good. His answer was that he was not going to leave all the good tunes to the devil. (Laughter.) And we want to be exceedingly careful that the impression shall not go out that good men intend to leave strength to those who serve the devil. (Laughter and applause.) "In the long run the man who is the best soldier, the work among the railroad men always particularly appealed to me because of the willingness of these men to take risks to accept responsibilities. THEODORE TO EDWARD

Messages Exchanged by the Wireless System Across the Atlantic.

South Wellfleet, Mass., Jan. 20.—The following is the text of the messages transmitted by the Marconi wireless system of telegraphy between Cape Cod and Cornwall, England, between President Roosevelt and King Edward: "His Majesty, Edward VII., London, England: In taking advantage of the wonderful triumph which scientific research and ingenuity has achieved in perfecting a system of wireless telegraphy, I extend on behalf of the American people most cordial greetings and good wishes to you and to all the people of the British empire. "Theodore Roosevelt, President, White House, Washington, America: I thank you most sincerely for the kind message which I have just received from you through Marconi's transatlantic wireless telegraphy. I sincerely reciprocate in the name of the people of the British empire the cordial greetings and friendly sentiment expressed by you on behalf of the American nation, and I
