MANY SAW THE CHICKENS

Second Day of the Show Drew Big Crowd—Prize Chickens and Cats.

An attendance of 2,200 demonstrated yesterday the marked success of the annual exhibit of the Minnesota Poultry association. No previous display has received so large a patronage.

The members of the Poultry association will dine to-night at the Commercial Club. After dinner the association will hold its annual meeting.

Prizes are awarded daily at the chicken show to exhibitors whose names are drawn by lot. Each purchaser of an admission ticket deposits his name and address in a box at the door. The prizes given away last night were a pair of Golden Wyandotte fowls to Thomas Marton, Hampshire Arms, this city; a pair of Black Minorcas to O. H. Schloesser, New Richmond, Minn., and a pair of Light Brahmans to Charles E. Curtis, Sixth Avenue hotel, this city.

In the cat department the greatest number of prizes was won by W. R. H. Smett. His cat Toodles, the winner of the Chicago cup, secured first prize, a silver bread tray. Toodles also gained for Mr. Smett the association cup as well as the Beresford medal for the best white cat. Additional prizes were given away: Beresford medal, best female cat, Josephine; Boutell's donation rug, best female Angora, Josephine; pair ladies' kid gloves for best short-haired kitten, Nellie; Boston prize for best long-haired kitten, Bonnie Eddie, and the prize for the best decorated cage, a pair of cat gloves for the best white female cat went to Dr. Patton of Minneapolis.
