BROWN SCANDAL

Utah Society Circles Torn Up by a Bad Case.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Feb. 20.—Arthur Brown, former United States senator, clubman and millionaire, faced a charge of adultery preferred by Mrs. Brown in the city court yesterday. On several occasions the senator created a scene and only quelled down when urged by his lawyers, Mrs. Brown, who was surrounded by society friends, sat in front of her husband and frequently prompted Prosecuting Attorney Westervelt.

Mrs. Brown has sworn to three complaints charging Mrs. Bradley with having sustained improper relations with Senator Brown. Mrs. Bradley, a rich, society woman and expects to be presented at court in London this season. She was Miss Isabelle Cameron of Kalamazoo, Mich., before she married Senator Brown.

The case has been the great society scandal of Utah for the past year. Two months ago Senator Brown and Mrs. Bradley were arrested for adultery, on warrants sworn out by Mrs. Brown. The senator walked through the streets with the woman and furnished bond for her. He announced his determination to stand by her to the end.

"Mrs. Bradley is an innocent woman," he said, "and I propose to vindicate her if it costs \$100,000 to accomplish it."

DEATH OF FATHER BOSCH Operation Performed at Omaha Could Not Save the Pine Ridge Indian Priest.

He was brought here a few weeks ago from the Pine Ridge Indian agency to undergo an operation in the hope of saving his life. He was 59 years old and was born in Germany. He came to this country twenty-five years ago.
