# Railroads

## MONEY FOR MRS. B.F. EGAN

Reward Raised at Breckenridge to Be Given to Her—Effort to Secure Life Insurance.

Reward money raised by men of the Breckenridge division of the Great Northern road to stimulate the search for Superintendent B. F. Egan of the Kalispell division, who was lost on the Rocky mountains, has been sent to Mrs. Egan in Spokane. The amount was \$500. Steps were begun yesterday to collect the life insurance for Mrs. Egan. Breckenridge men are back of the movement. The amount is about \$20,000. The companies will pay the loss if an indemnity bond is given for the return of the sum in case Mr. Egan is found alive. The matter will be taken up with President James J. Hill of the Great Northern.

The friends of Mr. Egan who formerly worked under him at Breckenridge believe that the body may be found in the spring, and they will renew the search then. Mountaineers say the chances are about even that wild animals have carried it off.

Mr. Egan disappeared Nov. 4. With others he was hunting at Lake Five, near Pelton, Mont. He was to walk one way around a lake and meet his friends at the other end. He never met the party, and, as a heavy snow fell, tracing was made very difficult. The long search was ineffectual.

## HEADED FOR BISMARCK

Story from Aberdeen that Milwaukee is "Pocketing" the Soo.

Aberdeen, S. D., Feb. 20.—An interesting story is that the Milwaukee and Northern Pacific have changed their agreement at the junction point of their lines between Aberdeen and Bismarck. Linton had been agreed upon. The Northern Pacific now runs to Linton and the Milwaukee extension and that the meeting-place will be Hague. Then the Milwaukee will build west from Hague to Winona, opposite Fort Yates, the line running about ten miles north of the Soo extension and "pocketing" the Soo. The story further alleges that the Milwaukee will build up the Missouri river from Winona to Bismarck.

## New Station for Minot.

Minot, N. D., Feb. 20.—It is understood from good authority that the Great Northern will build a new station at Minot, beginning work as early as the weather will permit. The station will cost from \$30,000 to \$35,000. The road's business at Minot has increased to enormous proportions in the last few years, and it is absolutely necessary that a larger station be built to accommodate the heavy traffic. It is also rumored from reliable sources that the offices of superintendents and train dispatchers, now at Larimore, N. D., and Havre, Mont., are to be moved to Minot as soon as the building is constructed. Minot is the terminal point of the Dakota and the Montana divisions of the Great Northern railway.

## Passenger Agents in Session.

General passenger agents are meeting in Chicago today to complete the formation of the protective bureau. The bureau grows out of the desire of the passenger departments of the railroads to look after violators of the law who make a business of manipulating tickets. This manipulation has extended to the point of obliterating dates of expiration, names of stations to which the ticket was originally sold, and the substitution of other dates and names to stations, to the great profit and greater loss of the railroads over whose lines it enabled the holder to travel.

## Dawson, N. D., Expectant.

Jamestown, N. D., Feb. 20.—The Northern Pacific is planning several improvements and extensions for the coming year. At Dawson a \$60,000 coal dock is to be erected. The new dock is at work and has a new line staked from Edgeley, north-west of Dawson. It is believed that the new line will be built next summer and citizens of Dawson are anticipating a big land boom in the section traversed by the new line.

## Mr. Hill Declines Offer.

It is reported that eastern men have approached James J. Hill with offers for the two big sea-going ships in process of construction at New London, Conn., for the Pacific-orient trade, and that the offers have not been accepted. The draft of the ships is so great that it will be impossible, according to general belief, for the boats to enter oriental harbors or to sail the shallow Yellow sea.
