BUSY ON BRIBERY CASES THROWN OUT COPELAND AS NURSE

The Grand Jury Is Looking Into Conditions Surrounding Certain City Contracts.

Ald. Powers Was Called in To-day and Told a Straight Story.

The grand jury to-day resumed its investigation of the Powers bribery charges. Alderman Powers having had his say yesterday, other witnesses were questioned this morning.

Among those examined were two Journal reporters, one of whom wrote the recent interview with Alderman Powers relative to the charges. The chief clerk, Alderman and Alderman S. S. and A. S. Adams of the council fire department committee.

The fact that a certain alderman, supposed to represent the suspected horse representative, has absented himself from the last two meetings of the fire committee and failed also to attend the council meeting Friday evening, has been commented upon as significant.

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Judge Lochren Dismisses Indictments Against Wis. Central and Ann Arbor Officials.

The Court Satisfied That the Charges Were Based Upon Imperfect Information.

The culmination of the proceedings under the indictments found last fall against four officials of the Wisconsin Central and the Ann Arbor railways culminated in the federal court this morning before Judge Lochren in an order of the court, made upon application of the United States attorney, dismissing all the gentlemen indicted.

The specific charge of a competitor of the Wisconsin Central railway company advised the interstate commerce commission and the department of justice that sundry shipments of mail stuffs had been made over the Wisconsin Central railway at rates and under circumstances indicative of a purpose on the part of the Wisconsin Central railway company to avoid the provisions of the act to regulate commerce and its various amendments.
