


New Hotel at Cottagewood.

This house stands on the site of the old Hotel Cottagewood which was destroyed by fire about a year ago. It will be thoroughly modern, equipped with a steam heating and acetylene gas lighting plants and will contain about seventy sleeping rooms. Several of the trees which were destroyed when the old house burned have been replanted, the lawn has been graded and material improvements have been on the grounds.

The Legislature CLIPS ITS POWERS

Peachey Bill, Abridging Authority of Board of Control, Passed in Senate.

Removes University, Normal Schools and Other Institutions From Board's Control.

The senate passed the Peachey bill yesterday afternoon by a vote of 38 to 25. This is identical with the Morley bill in the house, and removes the university, normal schools, schools for the deaf and blind at Fairbault and state school at Owatonna, from the financial supervision of the board of control.

The combination which pushed the bill through was engineered by the friends of the normal schools and the institutions at Fairbault and Owatonna. However, on the final passage of the bill the Hennepin delegation stood solidly with it, finding there was no show for the university alone. This was made apparent by the vote on an amendment offered by Senator Somerville, who led the fight on the bill. He wanted to bring out only the university, but his amendment was beaten by a vote of 12 to 49. Another amendment including the university and normal schools in the bill was still more snowed under by a vote of 8 to 53.

BOBLETTER'S BONDSMEN

A Bill to Reimburse Them Will Soon Appear.

Two years ago the legislature appropriated \$1,500 to reimburse Colonel Bobleter, former state treasurer, for the amount he had paid in settlement of the claims against him. Another bill to reimburse the bondsmen for the \$2,000 they paid the state was expected to follow but did not come at that session. It will be sprung on the present legislature in a few days. The bondsmen who paid the amount were Edward N. Saunders, Charles T. Miller as assignee of Robert A. Smith, insolvent, and A. B. Stickney as assignee of William Dawson, insolvent.

TO ABOLISH THE GALLOWES

The House Committee Approves the Lewis Electrocuting Bill.

The house committee on crimes and punishments reported favorably to-day on the bill by H. C. Lewis substituting electrocution for hanging as a mode of capital punishment. The bill provides for a private execution at the penitentiary, after isolation in a cell. The execution must take place before sunrise on one of the six days named by the governor, and no publication of the details is allowed.

Car Sweeping Bill Approved.

The Perley bill prohibiting car sweeping passed muster with the house committee on railroads yesterday afternoon, but the Deming bill requiring 28-foot cabooses on stock trains was killed.

FOR WATER BOND ISSUE

Hennepin Delegation Will Introduce Bill Authorizing \$100,000 Loan in House To-morrow.

The Hennepin delegation will introduce into the house to-morrow a bill empowering the Minneapolis city council to issue \$100,000 bonds for improving the water supply. The bill was sent over to St. Paul to-day by the city attorney, and requires the bonds to be paid within ten years out of the sinking fund. The delegation met at noon and decided to report for passage. The discussion developed considerable criticism of the methods in both the city council and the water-works committee. Mr. Gillette explained that \$215,000 had been spent on the North Side pumping station, as against the original estimate of \$100,000, and that the work was not yet completed. If it had been done by contract instead of day labor, he thought \$100,000 would have paid the bill. Lawrence H. Johnson objected to the introduction of any further bond measures, and particularly water bonds, because he thought the delegation had not received fair treatment from the council. He declared that members of the Minneapolis council had deliberately misrepresented facts and had wilfully lied. For that reason he voted against the introduction of the bill when the question was put. Other members who voted with him were Gillette, Hellwell, Girling and Possen. It is not likely, however, that any of them will carry their objection to the floor of the house.
