ABOVE PETTY TRIFT

Frank Bacon Says He's Never Done Any but 'State's Prison Jobs.'

He Tells How He and His Brother Robbed the Shull Residence.

"The only mistake we made was in getting caught," said Frank Bacon, one of the "gentleman" burglars, who confess to having stolen nearly \$2,000 worth of property from different Minneapolis and St. Paul residences, when interviewed by the county jail this morning.

The boys are frank, outspoken fellows who believe one is "honest-looking." They look one squarely in the eye, admit their shortcomings, and insist on gazing at the humorous side of a situation which will all probably have a state's prison sequel.

"I went into this game because I liked it—there ain't no two ways about that," said Frank, "getting pinched is a part of the game. But in the few years that I have been an active 'burg' I can say that I've never done any petty larceny work."

"I got plenty of light on the subject by using bullseyes, but maybe we didn't keep 'em turned away from the windows. To guard against any possibility of any one being sensitive on that point, we had every window shade in the particular room where we were taking stock, and no one ever bothered us. We did not feel that we were taking a chance after that."
