

# Normannaheimen GREAT LOSS TO ART

### In the Death of Frithjof Smith-Hald Last Wednesday in Chicago.

### He Had Done Much to Make Picturesque Norway Familiar to the World.

Frithjof Smith-Hald, the famous Norwegian artist died suddenly at his hotel in Chicago on Wednesday. He was threatened with pneumonia and was under the care of a physician, but his condition was not deemed critical and his death was quite unexpected. The remains were taken in charge by the consul. The deceased was in the best of health when he left Minneapolis a month ago to give an exhibit of his paintings in Chicago. During the two months Mr. Smith-Hald spent in the twin cities he impressed one as being very robust and active for a man of his age. His death will be greatly regretted, for as an artist he was in the meridian of his power.

Frithjof Smith-Hald was born at Christiansand, Norway, about fifty-six years ago. The Smith and Hald families are among the best in Norway. At the age of 19, Smith-Hald began the study of art in the Eckerberg studio in Dusseldorf. Then he went to Professor Gude at Carlsruhe only to return after a time to Dusseldorf. His preliminary work was completed at Paris where he achieved fame as a painter of coast views. His most famous paintings represent scenes along the coast of Norway and in Cornwall.

The sea he knew in its every mood and he depicted these moods with striking fidelity. Moonlight and sunlight effects on the mountain tops were also most effectively transferred to canvas by him. All the more important art collections in Europe have one or more Smith-Hald paintings, but in America he was chiefly known through various reproductions of his works. It is said of him that he has done as much as any other man to make the picturesque parts of Norway known to the world. During the past thirty years while counted a Parisian he traveled extensively in the world and he has been touring the United States with a collection of his works.

During the winter his family, consisting of a wife and two children, has been living in Berlin, where he expected shortly to join them.

**"Vermalendningarne."**  
The many friends of Richard Rosengren will have an opportunity to enjoy his art for the last time on Thursday, March 26, and Sunday, March 29, when the Swedish Dramatic company will produce the popular Swedish folk drama "Vermalendningarne," at Danla hall. Mr. Rosengren is a favorite and his departure for Sweden will be generally regretted. A cast of forty people, including Miss Emma Nilsson in the leading feminine role, will present the play, which includes many of the beautiful scenes and dances famous in the old country. The production will be a farewell and benefit to Mr. Rosengren.

**Nelson Is Ousted.**  
Washington, March 12.—After an investigation into charges that Victor E. Nelson, United States consul at Bergen, Norway, had applied to his own use part of a sum of money sent to him to be given to Norwegian relatives of seamen killed in the Maine disaster, the state department demanded Mr. Nelson's resignation. The demand was made by cable a week ago. No response having been received, the place was declared vacant and Edwin S. Cunningham, United States consul at Aden, was transferred to Bergen.

**Swedish Physicians.**  
There are 1,362 physicians entitled to practice medicine in Sweden. Of these the oldest is Dr. Hamburg-Smith, who, however, has lived in America for fifty years. He is 93 years of age. The youngest physicians are three newly created, M. D.'s, who are each 26 years of age. It would be quite impossible to complete the Swedish medical course at an earlier age.

**The Champion Skaters.**  
Wathen, the Finnish skater won the 500 metre race in the international races at St. Petersburg making a record of 49 2/3 seconds. Schwartz of Christiania was second in 50, and Manfred A. Tuzman, was third. In the 5,000 metre contest Kiselef, a Russian, won in 10:08. Bonnaes of Norway was second and Schwartz was third.

**A Dangerous Balloon.**  
"Svenske," the noted balloon which has had such an exciting career capped the climax of its pranks on Feb. 15 by disappearing altogether. An ascent was about to be made by four people when a gust of wind broke the ropes and the inflated globe disappearing swiftly southward.

**Unemployed in Gothenburg.**  
The society of unemployed in Gothenburg has organized several demonstrations of the work or bread. There were about 500 men in the parade on Feb. 12 which started from Skanstorget and ended at Heden, where an address was made by Editor Lindblad.

**Mother of Famous Children.**  
Mrs. Gustava Leffler died recently at Stockholm, Sweden, at the advanced age of 88 years. She was the mother of four distinguished children. Professors Mitling, Leffler and Fritz Leffler, Engineer Arthur Leffler and Anne Charlotte Leffler, a well known authoress.

**Consular Commission Agrees.**  
Lately news from Scandinavia brings the information that the members of the Swedish-Norwegian commission to consider the matter of separating the joint consular service had come to a full agreement on all the points in controversy. Dr. Sigurd Ibsen and Dr. Lagerheim were directed to draft the details.

**A Rival of De Laval.**  
A cream separator has been invented by Hjalmar Nordqvist, a manufacturer of Upsala. It is said to be very simple in construction, easily cleaned and to do its work in a most thorough manner. It will be made in Upsala and is expected to be in great demand ere long.

**Study in Polar Seas.**  
A Swedish scientific party will explore Locke Bay on Novaya Zemla next summer. The leader will be Otto Ekstam, who in addition to being a biologist of high rank has taken part in several expeditions to the polar regions.

**Still No Fish.**  
Nearly 2,000 fish boats were waiting at Solvaer, Norway, on Feb. 22, waiting for the appearance of the fish, but none have been seen. A steam trawler with 1,800 lines at a depth of 149 fathoms secured twenty-nine cod. Similar discouraging reports come from all the fishing towns along the coast.

**The Relief Fund.**  
Stockholm, March 13.—The famine relief committee has received total subscriptions amounting to about \$258,000, of which sum \$35,000 was sent from America.
