## IT IS A BUSY CORNER

Extreme Northwestern Corner of the United States—W. K. Morison Tells of Its Future.

W. K. Morison returned to-day from an extended trip through the west. He predicts great things for the immediate future of Washington, Oregon and northern California. That corner of the United States, he says, will see the greatest activity in the next fifteen or twenty years. Seattle will get the largest business of any of the cities. Mr. Morison says the Blethen, proprietors of the Seattle Times, have a large plant, but not large enough, and they are about to make additions. The lumber, the fishing and the farming industries are all booming, likewise the Alaskan trade.

Mr. Morison found business moving in Southern California, where his family will remain until May 1. They are at Redlands, one of the most beautiful spots in the state. Mr. Morison visited Coronado, the Catalina Islands, Los Angeles, San Francisco and other places of importance and interest.

# CITY NEWS. IT MEANS A SAVING CANNOT BE AVOIDED

Bill to Require Longer Notice to County Attorney Where Tax Titles Are Attacked. Civic Corruption Unavoidable in Present State of Political Evolution, Says Mayor Jones. Business Men the Last Class to Which to Look for Aid in Reform.

Cases in Which the County Has Been Compelled to Refund Large Amounts.

A bill has been placed in the hands of H. E. Fryberger of the Hennepin legislative delegation, which, if it becomes law, will require the county attorney and money by protecting its interests in tax title cases. The bill provides that, where the purchaser of the certificate, which, if successfully done, requires the state to refund with 10 or 12 per cent interest the amount of money paid by the purchaser, the holder of the certificate, which is the county attorney, while the original owner comes again into possession of his property.

The necessity of such a law as that outlined, therefore, is clear. It is illustrated by the case of the Hennepin district court. A case went through Judge Pond's court in which the county was obliged to refund taxes including interest amounting to \$11,742. The holder of the certificate successfully attacked its validity and required the county to refund his money and pay him this high rate of interest. No notice was given to the county attorney and no knowledge of the prosecution of the case was had in his office until the county auditor was called upon to authorize the payment of the same.

Yesterday another case came up in the same court and was advanced when the county attorney's staff were not present. The fact that one such case has gone through without notice to the county, and another was about to slip through in the same way, raises the question as to the ability of the county to protect the county's interest in matters of this kind, there being precedent for refusal of the court to proceed with such a hearing without the presence of the county attorney. It also emphasizes the importance of the passage of the bill placed in Mr. Fryberger's hands. Such cases are likely to come up at any time, and the county attorney should not be required to, and cannot be expected to, keep constant watch for cases of this kind on all obnoxious certificates.

Frank C. Griswold yesterday informed the council committee on roads and bridges that the portion of Hiawatha avenue between 24th and 26th streets, and the fourth street is covered by a heavy mortgage which was placed on the land when it was private property. Griswold holds the mortgage and he informed the committee that he would release the obligation if the city will vacate a portion of an alley in the block in question. Mr. Griswold wishes to use the property for truckage. No action was taken.

## VOICES OF AUTHORITY

Speaks in Praise of the Industrial Work of the Minneapolis Schools.

## Views of Dr. Michael E. Sadler on Ultimate Benefits of Such Work.

Superintendent of Schools C. M. Jordan has a letter from Dr. Michael E. Sadler of the London school board, thanking him for the rare specimens of drawing, painting and industrial work from the Minneapolis schools recently sent to London. What Dr. Sadler says in praise of the collection is of peculiar interest just now, when the industrial phase of school work is so sharply criticized in certain quarters. After commenting on the important part industrial work is now playing in popular education, and the need of widening its scope to keep pace with modern ideas, Dr. Sadler predicts that America is to be the stage on which the new education is to reach its greatest development. "I am personally much interested," writes Dr. Sadler, "in your methods of teaching drawing and painting, of which the specimens you have sent are such excellent illustrations. I believe more hearts in the educational value of these means of cultivating the power of self-expression. It has long been my belief that the America of the future, of a great artistic movement, the outcome of a natural form of democratic life under modern conditions, and during my journey through the United States I was much impressed by the steps which are being taken in the public schools, especially of Minneapolis, to prepare the way for a national appreciation of the value and beauty of artistic work."

Dr. Sadler added that he was about to show the exhibit to the Marquis of Londonderry, president of the board of education and that London teachers were greatly interested in the collection.
