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COUNCIL IS NAMED

Thirty-seventh Encampment of the Minnesota G. A. R. Comes to a Close.

The closing hours of the thirty-seventh encampment of the Minnesota G. A. R. at St. Paul yesterday were full of interest.

The council of administration for the coming year will consist of A. W. Guild of Minneapolis, P. G. Woodward of Anoka, J. O. Milne of Duluth, G. A. Whitney of Watons and J. D. Power of Marquette. These are all re-elections except the last.

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HOT TALK OVER HOSE

Fire Chief Canterbury Retorts to Ald. Westphal in Council Chamber.

After a spirited debate in which Alderman Westphal charged the fire chief with causing the city of the chamber entered a vigorous and emphatic denial, informing Alderman Westphal that he was deviating from the truth in making such allegations.

Alderman Westphal further aroused the chief's ire by directing attention to the "splendid machine" which he had built up in the department.

Partial Report from Stacy. The preliminary report of Frank N. Stacy as to the condition of the permanent improvement revolving fund, informing the council that \$100,000 legally belonged to that fund had been wrongfully credited to the sinking fund, was referred to the city attorney and the committee on accounts of city officials.

The issuance of \$350,000 of permanent improvement revolving fund bonds and \$150,000 of permanent improvement fund bonds was authorized.

An ordinance was passed prohibiting the erection of livery stables within 100 feet of residences and 500 feet of churches.

Resolutions adopted requiring the street railway company to improve its service on the Washburn Park and Camden Place, First avenue S and Twentieth avenue N and the Cedar and Emerson lines.

A Special Statute Committee. A communication was received from the public-spirited citizens who have arranged to present Mead's "Father of Good Wages" statue to the city. It was referred to a committee of one from each ward and the public grounds and building committee.

Rogers Won't Admit It. City Controller Joshua Rogers declared last evening that the \$100,000 which Frank N. Stacy says has been wrongfully charged to the sinking fund, is where it belongs.

As one of the sinking fund commissioners, he said he would vote against any attempt to take the money out of the sinking fund, no matter what action might be taken by the council or other members of the commission. An order from the court, he further remarked, would be necessary before he would agree to the transfer.

A Valuable Rabbit Hole. Forty acres of pure plaster of paris, from ten to fifty feet thick, is the result of the effort of two boys to smoke a rabbit out of a hole under a ledge on Gloss Mountain, Woods county, O. T. The gypsum ledge was formerly the home of numerous wild creatures, which lived in the crevices of the rocks, using dry cow chips, sticks and other rubbish for their nests.

The whole mountain side was a mass of flames almost immediately when fire was applied, and it burned for days. Only 300 degrees is required to convert gypsum into plaster of paris, and the ledge is being transformed into white powder. The building has been remodeled, a large assembly room has been provided and the rooms upstairs are rented, for a nominal sum, to transients in the city or to poor people who have little money and no place to sleep.
