Traffic Fostered by an Association With Headquarters on the Pacific Coast.



Washington, March 16.—Hon. Willis Van Devanter, recently appointed United States circuit judge for the Eighth judicial circuit, took the oath of office in

and is probably the youngest circuit judge in the United States. Judge Van Devanter attended the common school of his native city, later the Indiana Asbury (now De Pauw) university and graduated in law from the law school of the Cincinnati college. He removed to Cheyenne in 1884, where he became in succession city attorney, member of the territorial legislature, a commissioner to revise the statute laws of Wyoming, and by appointment of President Harrison, in 1893, chief justice of the territorial supreme court.

RITUALIZING TENDENCY

The Commons Intends to Discipline the Church.

London, March 16.—The church discipline bill, passed on its second reading in the house of commons Saturday by a majority of 51, is significant. In 1899 the increasingly energetic campaign against the ultraritualistic and Romanizing practices of the established church resulted in a resolution by the house of commons that if the efforts of the archbishops and bishops to secure due obedience from the clergy were not speedy and effectual, further legislation would be required.

CARTER'S SURE THING A BOILER BROKE LOOSE

The Chicago City Convention of the Democrats Nominates Him for Mayor Again.

Chicago, March 16.—Mayor Carter H. Harrison was renominated for a fourth term in the democratic city convention here today. The remainder of the slate chosen from the ducky of democratic leaders yesterday was as follows: For city treasurer, Ernest Hummel; for city clerk, William Loeffler; for city attorney, John E. Owens. Just before the hour set for the opening of the convention, however, Loeffler declined to run and the name of J. J. Boehm was substituted. The convention was called to order soon after 10 o'clock in North Side turner hall with Thomas J. Webb as temporary chairman and Edward Lahoff temporary secretary.

Terrible Accident in a Toledo Mill of the Republic Iron & Steel Company.

Toledo, March 16.—In a boiler explosion which wrecked a large portion of the East Toledo mills of the Republic Iron & Steel company today, one man was killed and two others burned so badly that they may die. The dead: JOHN THOMSEN, water tender, aged 41, unmarried; formerly of Findlay, Ohio. The injured: Melvin Updegraff, aged 38, night engineer, married; burned and head and face crushed by falling bricks; Henry Fust, aged 56, watchman, burned about head and face and crushed by boiler. Both injured men have large families. It will never be known how the accident occurred, as the dead man was the only one near the boiler. The top of the boiler, weighing a ton, was blown through the air for half a mile, flying just over the tops of twenty houses, and finally coming to rest in a field deep in the ground. Iron flues by the dozen were driven deep into the earth. One entire end of the mill was blown out, causing a property damage of \$40,000. It will take a month to repair the plant.

THE CUBAN TARIFF

Why Germany Will Ask for the Same Treatment.

Berlin, March 16.—Germany, as soon as the reciprocity treaty between Cuba and the United States is signed, will ask both the Cuban and United States governments for identical privileges. Intimations have been made that other governments intend also to request the same treatment. While annoyed at the prospect of the United States trade having lower tariffs in Cuba than that of Germany no one supposes that a collective protest on the part of the continental countries would cause either the United States or Cuba to recede. But Germany's position is to be defined clearly, so that the United States will not complain when Germany shows other nations preferential treatment.

FOREIGN FLASHES

London.—Reynolds' Newspaper publishes a story that the Prince of Wales, who is the recipient of \$100,000 yearly in addition to \$30,000 from the duties of Cornwall revenues, is unable to live on that amount. Paris.—Paris medical authorities are divided as to whether alcohol is roasting or not, and their dispute has reached the point where each school has discarded the "dead walls" with posters appealing to the "good sense" of the public. Rome.—The Giornale d'Italia declares that the excavations that are being made in the forum are endangering the buildings on Palatine hill. The edifices of Severus, the Trajans and the stadium are threatened with ruin, and Caesar's palace shows signs of collapse. London.—William Waldorf Astor's paper, the Pall Mall Gazette, has seized the promoting of Sir Archibald Forbes' bill—whom Mr. Astor ordered out of his house two seasons ago because he came innesting with the Countess of Oxford on the occasion for retreating a series of special articles praising Milne.
