PROGRAM IS VARIED

Number of Interesting Events Will Be Seen at Y. M. C. A. Carnival To-night.

Mallet, the Fencing Champion, Will Meet Five Amateurs in Handicap Bout.

The gymnastic carnival to be held at the Y. M. C. A. this evening promises to be well attended. As a number of the events scheduled for the evening will be competitive, great interest is being taken in the carnival and Dr. Weston, the physical instructor, is confident that a snug sum will be realized for the summer camp fund.

In the fencing contests, which will be one of the features of the evening, some of the best amateurs in the city will try conclusions with Arthur B. Mallet, the northwestern champion, who has agreed to meet any five amateurs in the twin cities and scoring three points against each adversary before his opponent counts once. Already six men have accepted the challenge, but as Mr. Mallet has agreed to meet only five, one of these challenges will be thrown out.

H. C. Hirsche, the champion wing-shot of America, Knight, Tanner, Hughes, Corson and Newton comprise the six fencers who wish to try conclusions with the champion. One of the recent additions to the already well filled program will be a three-round sparring bout between Detective Gallagher and Dr. Weston. As the latter will be handicapped by over fifty pounds in weight, the chances are that the physical instructor will be decisively out-pointed by his big opponent.

NO MORE HIGH SALARIES

Baseball Stars May Expect a Big Cut When Their Present Contracts Expire.

The present season will put an end to the era of big salaries for baseball players. Those players who were fortunate enough to have made three or four-year contracts before the baseball war was terminated will continue for a time to reap the profits of their thrift and foresight, but all who make new contracts from now on will have to submit to radical cuts. Some of the salaries to be paid this year are up in the five figures. The \$10,000 which was necessary to secure Willie Keeler for the New York Americans from Brooklyn is without precedent in the history of the game. It is not only the highest salary ever received by a ball player, but is, in fact, more money than was paid out in salaries to entire teams twenty years ago.

"Fatsy" Donovan, the star outfielder and captain of the St. Louis Cardinals, is another player who was lucky enough to get his name signed to a contract calling for \$9,000 for the season. Third in the list of player plutocrats comes John Chesbro, the crack twirler of the Pittsburgh National league team of last year, who will play with the New York Americans this year. If Chesbro pitches an average of two games a week he will receive \$333.33 per game. Dave Fultz, who was the Philadelphia Athletics' outfielder last season, has made a good contract with the New York Americans for this year. He will receive a salary of \$6,000 for his work. La Jolo's contract with the Cleveland American league club has two years to run at \$6,000. Wallace will get only \$500 less from St. Louis. Delehanty, who is now in the baseball limelight by reason of his breaches of contracts, will get \$4,500 for his season with Washington if he keeps his contract.

President Hermann of the Cincinnati National league club to-day said that Cincinnati will refuse to play with the New York National league team if Delehanty and George Davis, both of whom were awarded to American league clubs at the peace conference, appear on the field with the Great aggregation.

"If Delehanty and Davis do not live up to the provisions of the peace compact we will get together and blacklist them," said Hermann.

It is currently reported that there is a movement back of Delehanty and Davis that seeks to break the peace agreement of Jan. 21, which assigned players, fixed circuits and made other provisions.

MINNESOTA GETS MEET

Western Intercollegiate Gymnastic Contest Will Be Held in This City April 3.

Dr. L. J. Cooke, gymnastic director at the state university yesterday received a message from Dr. Edson, gymnastic director at Wisconsin university, asking if Minnesota would entertain the annual western intercollegiate gymnastic meet April 3. The meet was originally scheduled to be held at Champaign, Ill., but finding that the meet would be unprofitable there, Illinois offered it to Wisconsin, which in turn passed the chance on to Minnesota.

Upon receipt of the offer Dr. Cooke called a conference of the university athletic authorities, who decided to entertain the meet. The university gymnasium is admirably equipped for such a contest, and has all the necessary apparatus for the various events.

Teams from Chicago, Wisconsin, Grinnell, Northwestern and Minnesota will be represented at this year's meet. The local team includes J. W. Dye, captain; W. B. Dye, Hieston, Haeberle, Ostvig and Van Rohr. The events on the program for the meet include contests on the broad horse, long horse, horizontal bar and flying rings, club swinging and tumbling.
