Tremendous Rush of Immigrants From Europe and Eastern Canada to the West.

Peers of the Realm and House of Commons Members Will See the Country.

Winnipeg, Man., March 20.—The transcontinental express from the east has again been divided into three sections to provide accommodation for immigration from Europe and eastern Canada.

English Lords Coming

If arrangements now in progress are consummated, as there appears to be every probability they will be, Manitoba and the west will be visited during the coming season by a most distinguished party of legislators of Great Britain.

The party is being organized by Lord Lyveden and will consist of peers of the realm and members of the British house of commons. The purpose of the visit to Canada is primarily for pleasure, but incidentally to enable the members of the party to see for themselves the greatness of the dominion and learn by personal observation something about its resources.

Entertainment

It is understood that the matter of arranging for receiving the visitors will be discussed by Sir Daniel McMillan with the members of the provincial executive and doubtless steps will be taken by the various representative institutions and public bodies towards affording the suggested facilities.

It is pointed out that the visit of members of the house of lords to the house of commons to Canada will doubtless be of great value from an educational standpoint, as the tourists cannot fail to be impressed with what they will see.

TOLD IN A LINE

London—George Chapman, a Southwark saloon-keeper, who was charged with the murder of three women, was sentenced to death.

New York—August Belmont, at his office in the Equitable building to-day, refused to confirm or deny the report of his resignation as president of the National City Bank.

Nashville, Tenn.—Three men charged with murder, made their escape from the jail, from which they were taken by a party of men.

Bloomington, Ill.—A jury in the McLean county circuit court to-day found four men guilty of chicken theft and sentenced them to prison and the men should be sentenced to the penitentiary.

Delaware, Ohio—Twelve students of Ohio Wesleyan university, six young women and six young men, were suspended from college for the remainder of the term upon charges that they had danced.

Rutland, Vt.—The carelessness of Alexander Kemper in smoking a pipe in a room where he is visiting, and Mrs. MacLaren, who is with him, is also ill.

Chicago—Bishop MacLaren, of the Chicago diocese of the Protestant Episcopal church, is seriously ill of an unknown disease at St. James, Ill., where he is visiting, and Mrs. MacLaren, who is with him, is also ill.

Chicago—George Willard, sought by the police of two continents for years for a daring \$80,000 robbery committed in Manila, was arrested in a revolver fight with two detectives on a crowded North Halsted street car.

Johnstown, Pa.—The breaking of a coupling followed by a runaway of a string of loaded coal cars in the Sunbeam mine at South Fork, caused the death of three men, the fatal injury of one and serious injuries to nine others.

Battle Creek, Mich.—Joseph Brady, a farm hand, with a loaded shotgun, shot and killed Mrs. F. B. Bowerman, dangerously wounded her 14-year-old daughter and attempted to kill her son, aged 17. He has been committed to jail.

Sydney, N. S.—As a result of an explosion in Pompanon No. 1 colliery at Glace Bay, C. P., four men are missing, seventy-eight horses were suffocated by fire and property estimated at half a million dollars was destroyed.

Albany, N. Y.—The assembly committee on insurance has decided favorably the bill providing that life insurance companies that combine to regulate rates shall forfeit their charters and be liable to punishment for misdeemeanor.

Paris—The city was completely given up yesterday to the annual carnival of the mid-winter festivities. Governmental and commercial business was suspended and hundreds of thousands were thronged with merry-makers in picturesque costumes.

Chicago—"The runaway of the legless boy" now figures in the police annals. Leaving his artificial limbs locked up in a closet, Thomas Harry, 14 years old, stole out of his home at West Park and Miller street, while his father slept. He has since been caught.

Fitch, N. Y.—F. J. Lord, student of Cornell university, who had typhoid fever, is dead in the Masonic home in this city. The young man was a Mason of the first degree and held a state scholarship at Cornell. He was trying to work his way through college.

New Bedford, Mass.—W. E. Hoise, who was expected to accompany Captain Coffin in his attempt to reach the north pole as commander of the steamer Albatross, announces that he will not go as he has not been able to make satisfactory financial arrangements.

Chicago—Alexander Holland, society man, clubman and golf player, well known in both New York and Chicago, was yesterday arrested by the police on charges of conspiracy to defraud the J. S. Pappan company, doing a railway supply business. The case was continued till Tuesday.

Jefferson City, Mo.—The legislature providing that every railroad in Missouri shall free passes to each state officer, each supreme judge, each judge of all the courts of appeals and circuit courts, each railroad commissioner, each member of the general assembly, each sheriff, the president or superintendent of each state institution, was adopted by both the house and senate. It will be submitted to the voters at the next general election.

CAPITAL CULLINGS

Charles Bates is mentioned for allotting agent at Escalade, S. D.

It is now proposed to have all public buildings done under contract.

Alvah T. Bridgeman was appointed postmaster at Springfield, Box Homme county, S. D., vice Robert L. Wilson, resigned.

Two additional clerks at \$600 a year each have been allowed for duty in the postoffice at Duluth, and the salaries of sixteen clerks have been increased \$100.

The salary of one clerk in the Northfield, Minn., postoffice has been increased \$100, and two clerks in the Yankton, S. D., postoffice have each received allowances of \$100 additional a year.

Plans have been started on a dredge for Lake Erie which will cost \$175,000. Dredges will also be built for operations on the Fox and Black rivers, in Michigan, and for the western shore of Lake Michigan.

Jose Estrada Palma, a son of Thomas Estrada Palma, president of Cuba, will find relief by wearing a student at a normal college and the daughter of David B. Jacobs, tobacco importer, were privately married on Feb. 11.

The South Dakota senators have just succeeded in doing something which rarely happens in these days of civil service reform. It was decided about a year ago that all appointments at the Indian bureau at Canton, S. D., should be made on certification of the civil service commission. The senators have had this ruling reversed.

The international syndicate, headed by the Seligman, has renewed on a larger scale than at its first venture the offer to assume Venezuela's debts to the powers on conditions. L. N. Seligman has been in Washington two days that past, and he has been at the White House and has communicated with some members of the diplomatic body.

Minister Bowen has addressed to Sir Michael Herbert, the British ambassador, a note calling attention to the delay and to the rumors that have been current that the powers are disposed to send the question of preferential treatment to The Hague. Mr. Bowen urged it as desirable that some declarations should be made by the allies as to what they will do.
